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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	MR. ADKINS: All right. Patriots please take
3	your seats. All right. Good morning everyone.
4	Welcome back to the seating hall (phonetic). I
5	believe the Sergeant at Arms has already made a
6	comment about cellphones. I want to reiterate, but
7	we do have some other, you know, announcements. You
8	know, first of all, again, no weapons. We won't do
9	a roll call first thing this morning. We'll do

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1	Lou or Steve. So National Commander.
2	MR. FERGUSON: Good morning.
3	AUDIENCE: Good morning, sir.
4	MR. FERGUSON: How is everybody doing today?
5	AUDIENCE: Good. Great.
6	MR. FERGUSON: How was that hospitality room
7	last night? Okay. Give them a round of applause
8	for that. That was actually my only meal I had that

8	moving forward. And that is our objective. What do
9	we need to do to get this order to move forward in
10	the right direction?
11	So without further ado, I know we want to keep
12	a few things I want to announce we got a
13	couple of people that was in here I want to announce
14	about, and I want to announce one of the things.
15	One of our patriots that is here is actually the
16	National Senior Vice Commander in Chief of the VFW.
17	I had to make sure to get the title right because it
18	was a little different than ours. And then it's
19	Al Lipheart. He is here. He is a patriot out of
20	Georgia. And I wanted to give a recognition to him.
21	And he will be the incoming Commander in Chief of
22	the VFW this next year.
23	Okay. Okay. All right. Sorry. Admin notes,
24	making sure I get things on here. So next I have

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invited a guest that was here. Long story short, I

1	hate to say I've known this person since high
2	school. Might actually I don't even know, maybe
3	even the junior high. The problem that I had with
4	this one, I didn't know what he was looking for. So
5	it was through, actually, her social media, is how
6	we ended up getting contact that was on this.
7	So the power of social media is out there. And
8	this was something that I didn't know that he was
9	passionate about. And he has something him and
10	his wife that wanted to do for us. And I've talked
11	about how we need to promote this order, how we need
12	to promote things that's out. And he's willing to
13	come up and do something else here, to do something
14	with this project. And I don't want to explain all
15	of it because he has more of the details on it. But
16	he needs for us to know what he's doing.
17	And, actually, how many people would be
18	interested in a film about the Purple Heart? How
19	many would be interested?
20	AUDIENCE: Yeah.
21	MR. FERGUSON: Yeah?
22	AUDIENCE: Yeah.
23	MR. FERGUSON: Knowing what is going on,
24	without further ado, I would like to introduce John
25	(phonetic) Popa and Shannon Popa, come up here and



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1	talk about what they're going to do with this
2	project.
3	MS. POPA: Good morning.
4	AUDIENCE: Good morning.
5	MS. POPA: In 1943, a young lieutenant was
6	commanding a patrol torpedo boat near the Solomon
7	Islands in the Pacific Ocean. While he was serving,
8	a Japanese warship rammed the side of the boat.
9	AUDIENCE: We're having difficulty hearing you.
10	Sorry to interrupt.
11	MR. ADKINS: Step forward.
12	MS. POPA: Okay. I'll start over, sorry. So
13	in 1943, in August of that year, a young lieutenant
14	was commanding a patrol torpedo boat in near the
15	Solomon Islands in the Pacific Ocean. While he was
16	serving, a Japanese warship rammed the side of the
17	boat. The young lieutenant suffered a back injury.
18	Several soldiers were killed, and others were flung
19	into a sea of burning oil. Despite his back injury,
20	the young lieutenant dove into the water and managed
21	to save three men.
22	As they were clinging to the sinking ship, the
23	wreckage there, he asked his men he said, do you
24	want to surrender to the Japanese, or do you want to
25	continue to fight? The men voted to continue to

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fight. So they swam three miles to a nearby island. The young lieutenant took a badly injured man and strapped him into a life jacket and towed him by holding the strap in his teeth and swimming.

5 You may have heard this story before. The 6 soldier, his name was John F. Kennedy. Now, this 7 room is full of heroes who could sacrifice for our 8 country. And I'm sure there are many other stories 9 of heroism and sacrifice that you could all share 10 with us. And my husband and I sincerely want to 11 thank you for your sacrifice and your service. My 12 name is Shannon Popa. This is my incredibly talented 13 husband, John Popa, and he has written a film script 14 entitled The Purple Heart. The story is about a 15 veteran who finds a purple heart, and it's about his 16 soul-searching mission to find the owner of that 17 purple heart. And he discovers, during that 18 mission, that the heroic owner's past closely 19 intertwined with his own.

I'm sure you will agree that the patriotism in this country has been declining over the past few years. We need -- we need to call attention to the sacrifices that have been made that keeps our country safe, that gives us the freedom that we enjoy today.

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1	So I hope that you guys will consider helping
2	us. We need to raise approximately \$75,000 to bring
3	this film to to make it into a full-length
4	motion picture. John and I will be in the lobby
5	until right after lunch. We would love to meet you
6	all personally, to hear your stories of sacrifice
7	and to talk to you about our project. We do want to
8	thank you so much for your time and attention, but
9	most of all for your service and your sacrifice.
10	Thank you.
11	MR. FERGUSON: John and Shannon, really great
12	that you came up here to do that. I know this is
13	one thing we talked about promoting the order, and
14	this is would be a great tool for us and a good
15	support to keep things up and going. I know I
16	think they got some flyers and some information,
17	right?
18	So make sure we link up with them and talk to
19	them. Don't everybody jump up and see if you can be
20	one of the actors in the film. I think there's a low
21	budget on that part. That was right here, so no
22	MS. POPA: If he wants to be in the movie,
23	that's fine.
24	MR. FERGUSON: Okay. So I can see everybody

14	discovered that there was a flaw on a resolution
15	was it 14 or 15, Keith?
16	MR. GRAY: Keith Gray, Department Commander,

18	MR. ADKINS: Okay. It was sent back to Arizona
19	because they figured it out, and they have
20	resubmitted the corrected copy. And per the bylaws,

15	to submit the corrected resolution to the Bylaws

2	Okay. One, two, three, four. All right. The
3	majority has it. All right. Robert, it's all aye.

6	MR. ADKINS: Oh, yeah.
7	MR. MCINTOSH: Commander, request personal
8	privilege to speak?
9	MR. FERGUSON: Permission granted. Nick
10	McIntosh speaking.
11	MR. MCINTOSH: Nick McIntosh, Historian. The
12	Public Bylaws Committee, after the 14 which came
13	from Kentucky, they had a meeting, voted against it
14	without having a hearing. Last night on this 15
15	14 and 15, there was no discussion allowed by the
16	Bylaws Committee so that members have not had any
17	opportunity to voice what their opinion is.
18	Are you going to direct the Bylaws Committee to
19	allow members to be able to ask questions and make
20	statements at the Bylaws Committee meeting?
21	MR. FERGUSON: I'll let the National Adjutant
22	address that.
23	MR. ADKINS: Okay. I know in Robert's Rules,
24	it says, should have a hearing. It doesn't say
25	shall, will, or must. All right. We had a

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1	discussion last night. That was a debate. When we
2	go through the Bylaws Committee today, we will have
3	a debate. That could be considered your hearing.
4	One of the reasons why the bylaws go out to the
5	NEC, at least because I sent it out to all
6	individuals that were coming to this convention for
7	them to review, all right, I saw e-mails go back and
8	forth with giving opinions on some of the bylaws.
9	So a debate could you can consider that a debate.
10	It was at least a discussion, even if it was by e-
11	mail.
12	So we are having a debate on the bylaws today.
13	We had one last night. Patriots were allowed to
14	speak by the chair of the Bylaws Committee. You had
15	your opportunity to be here to voice your opinions
16	to the Bylaws Committee. Thank you. Oh, Chuck
17	Adkins, National Adjutant. Sorry, Lynsi.
18	MR. MCINTOSH: Nick McIntosh. We were told,
19	specifically, we couldn't make comments. And this
20	in the meeting when they were in the meeting. We
21	had discussions on one or two bylaws. And then it
22	was said no more discussion from anybody. What I'm
23	asking for today is that any member that wants to go
24	to the Bylaws Committee because they get to put up a
25	recommendation. They have there's information

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1	available sometimes that they don't know about.
2	If you come to a convention and being shut
3	out on the Bylaws Committee, that happened last
4	year. I take back I take that last statement
5	back. This year we were not no one was allowed
6	to speak on anything, much less 14 and 15. What I'm
7	asking and there is this will be the first time
8	we you the organization has not allowed a
9	patriot to be able to speak at a Bylaws Committee
10	meeting that was held at a convention.
11	MR. FERGUSON: So National Commander
12	Ferguson. I was sitting in the meeting. I did not
13	hear the statement that you could not talk about it.
14	I think the discussion was held, if I remember
15	right, and then they finished with the resolution
16	that was on that and moved forward. I remember
17	seeing all you guys come up to the microphone and
18	talking. I do have to admit that I don't remember
19	hearing all the conversations because I was over
20	there having another conversation on the side.
21	MR. MCINTOSH: Well, it was after the
22	discussion that happened on those two. It was
23	specifically said there will be no more discussion
24	on
25	MR. FERGUSON: Is that correct?

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1	MR. ADKINS: Yeah.
2	MR. FERGUSON: Okay. I got I got that part.
3	Before you come Middleton, we have a Raymond
4	Wetzel.
5	MR. WETZEL: Yeah. Raymond Wetzel, Senior Vice
6	to California, Bylaws Committee. There was a lot of
7	discussion going on and it kept going on, and going
8	on, and going on and hashing over the same items
9	that whole time. And it got to the point where we,
10	as a Bylaws Committee, could not perform our duties
11	last night. So at that point in time, the
12	chairperson said, is there any more questions?
13	There was no more questions, and he closed all of
14	the conversations.
15	So there was ample opportunity for
16	conversations at that point in time because I,
17	specifically, stated felt that I was challenged
18	by people that were making comments to the bylaws.
19	And I picked discussion to it. And it was stated.
20	So everyone had their opportunity last night. Thank
21	you.
22	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate from
23	Georgia. First of all, the point of order, and that
24	is that that vote on that resolution we just had was
25	conducted at 0905 hours. Just for the record, it

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means we can't take it up again until at least 0905 hours tomorrow.

My recollection of last night's activities, there was a bit of a robust discussion from outside the membership. In other words, they allowed other than the committee, to make comments and such to a point. And then at one point, as I recall, the chairman asked for a vote of the committee to -- a motion was made to cut off all the outside dialogue.

10 And it was moved, seconded, and passed by the 11 committee to end that discourse, and only new 12 committee business -- in other words, only 13 recognized committee members. That's my 14 recollection of what happened. Up until that point, 15 there was some pretty robust discussion from --16 MR. FERGUSON: Correct. 17 MR. MIDDLETON: -- other than members of the 18 committee. Thank you. Patriot Smrt. 19 MR. FERGUSON: 20 MR. SMRT: Patriot Smrt, Kentucky Chapter 146. 21 Reinforcing what Patriot Middleton said, ditto. But 22 to put the final point on this, it is the 23 opportunity for us, at least from Department of 24 Kentucky, for which I had responsibility as the

25 Adjutant, to ensure that it passed, you know, and



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was properly annotated, signed, and sent forward, 2 you know, for the packet.

3 When it came to individually walking the dog 4 for each amendment, not resolution, guys, we're 5 doing interchangeable. These are bylaw, you know, 6 amendments to possibly change. We weren't allowed 7 -- one by one, the chairman and all the committee 8 just talked. How about one, you still agree? How 9 about two, do you still agree? How about three? We 10 were waiting for our opportunity for 2024-14 to come 11 up so we could defend it. But we were told we could 12 not speak at that time.

13 Then there was an opportunity at the very last 14 end of the meeting to comment. But by that time, 15 all the votes, all the activity, and all approval of 16 the committee had already been conducted so that we 17 couldn't, at least even as the Department of 18 Kentucky, defend the bylaw that had been submitted.

19 So there was a six and one-half dozen of the 20 other open at the front of the meeting, but in order 21 to get the meeting concluded, then we were locked 22 out and couldn't comment on each individual passage, 23 even if we had pertinent information to prove that 24 there was issues, problems, or, you know, things 25 that should have been considered.



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1	But thank you. That's my recollection of being
2	there, being very robust and on and off the mic for
3	the first 20 minutes.
4	MR. FERGUSON: Patriot McIntosh.
5	MR. MCINTOSH: Patriot McIntosh, National
6	Historian. I still haven't gotten an answer. Are
7	you going to direct that anybody that wants to go to
8	the Bylaws Committee meeting on this can speak?
9	MR. FERGUSON: Every everybody can come and
10	speak. But it's also it's the Committee Chairman
11	who is trying to conduct a business that's there. I
12	and I understand that. So the same thing was
13	setting up and attending to an agenda to a meeting,
14	that's your the person who can change the agenda
15	is the chairman that's on that.
16	MR. MCINTOSH: Yes. But what I want was I
17	asked for, as you supersede an appointed chairman,
18	to direct that the patriots here be allowed to speak
19	not at the will of the chairman.
20	MR. FERGUSON: You got a comment online.
21	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah.
22	MR. FERGUSON: Go ahead and speak.
23	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Just go ahead, Larry.
24	MR. LEIGHTON: Just a reminder that the Bylaws
25	Committee is going to meet this afternoon at the set

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1	time. Should only be recorded or discussing the
2	resolution that was just approved to go to the
3	Bylaws Committee. Everything else has already been
4	taken care of.
5	MR. FERGUSON: Everybody, do you understand
6	that?
7	AUDIENCE: No. No. We didn't hear a thing.
8	MR. FERGUSON: Can you get him to restate that?
9	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton, Department of
10	Arizona. The Bylaws Committee meeting that is going
11	to meet today should only be referring or, at least,
12	reviewing the resolution that was just passed to be
13	sent to the Bylaws Committee. All other resolutions
14	have already been ruled on.
15	MR. FERGUSON: Did everybody hear that, again?
16	AUDIENCE: No.
17	MR. FERGUSON: Okay. Can you put the
18	microphone next to the speaker, please?
19	MR. ADKINS: We're going to start. One more
20	time, Larry.
21	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton, Department of
22	Arizona. The Bylaws Committee that meets today
23	should only be reviewing the resolution of the
24	amendment that was just passed to go to the Bylaws
25	Committee. All other resolution amendments have

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1	already been ruled on by the committee and reviewed
2	by the committee.
3	AUDIENCE: That's correct. Yes. That's
4	correct. That's correct.
5	MR. FERGUSON: So everybody understand that?
6	AUDIENCE: Yes.
7	MR. FERGUSON: Okay. PNC Garcia.
8	MR. GARCIA: Thank you, National Commander.
9	Past National Commander Garcia. Sir, in the past
10	conventions, it has been to where the Bylaws
11	Committee, where Victor (phonetic) McIntosh had been
12	the secretary has not at times has not allowed
13	any comments or questions from the floor.
14	Last night, when we had the Bylaws Committee,
15	the conversations back and forth lasted about 30
16	minutes. At that time, I got up, and I made a
17	recommendation to the chair to stop taking questions
18	from the floor and start moving with the Bylaws
19	Committee. They had everything in half an hour. We
20	would have continued it would have probably took
21	taken three, four hours to get through these
22	things.
23	But, National Adjutant, you've been at some of
24	these conventions where you asked for permission to
25	ask questions or make comments and you haven't been

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1	allowed where I was in the Bylaws Committee, myself.
2	Thank you.
3	MR. FERGUSON: Yeah. Okay. All right. I'm
4	just going to stop this.
5	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: What? No
6	MR. FERGUSON: No. It's fine. So, again, we
7	will be able to talk about the resolutions when they
8	come up, or you can give your comments when they
9	come up, on what we're doing with on the voting
10	next year. Because if we're going to keep doing this
11	we've got a timeline that we're going to keep to.
12	Other than that, we're going to be way late
13	into the tonight. So my ruling is just go by
14	what we have that was here and start in with the
15	bylaws. We're at minutes.
16	MR. WITT: Commander?
17	MR. FERGUSON: Go ahead. Yes. I'm sorry,
18	Sergeant-At-Arms.
19	MR. WITT: So Gary Witt, National Sergeant-At-
20	Arms. Just a reminder that I'm going to be making a
21	timer, three minutes speaking, and I'll cut you off.
22	I'll let make a reminder after one you got one
23	minute left. And then you can just keep that in
24	mind. Okay.
25	MR. ADKINS: Thank you, Sergeant-At-Arms.

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1	
1	National Adjutant, Chuck Adkins. Yeah. And I
2	concur with what PNC Garcia said. Having attended
3	some of the Bylaws Committees before and was told I
4	couldn't speak, but it was through the good graces
5	of the chairman, Doug Middleton at the end, he did
6	open it up, and we were allowed.
7	All right. The bylaws. Okay. The bylaws
8	state there are no closed meetings in a national
9	convention with the exception of disciplinary
10	hearings and region caucuses. So Bylaws Committee
11	is open, okay? Anybody can come in and attend. So
12	they can attend any of the meetings with the
13	exception, if you're not in Region 4, you can't go
14	to Region 4's caucus. You have to go to your own.
15	Obviously, for privacy reasons, you know, you just
16	can't march into the DHP without being invited.
17	All right. One of the first things we need to
18	take care of this morning before we go into the
19	bylaws, there were six actions taken by the National
20	Executive Committee between the conventions. The
21	very first one was to adjust the budget. And it was
22	a vote that was taken by the NEC from 2 to 5 October
23	to approve or disapprove the revised MOPH budget,
24	all right? And all the adjustments and everything
25	was there.

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1	
1	Out of the ballots that were received, 45 voted
2	yes to approve, one voted not to disapprove, and two
3	abstained, okay? The tellers were Shar Gatlin,
4	Department of Montana, Douglas Middleton, Department
5	of Georgia, and Deron Santiny of the Department of
6	Louisiana. All right. If and now we need the
7	Supreme Body to either ratify, approve, or reject,
8	disapprove, the budget adjustment. Patriot
9	Middleton?
10	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate,
11	Georgia. I move that the Supreme Body approve the
12	vote of the National Executive Committee on
13	adjustment of the budget.
14	MR. J. ANDERSON: Jim Anderson. I second the
15	motion.
16	MR. ADKINS: Okay. All in favor of approving
17	the NEC action of adjusting the 2023, 2024 ballot,
18	please stand. Yes. If you can't stand, please
19	raise your hand. Thank you. All right. Please
20	remain standing or your hand up while the Sergeant-
21	At-Arms grabs our count. Okay. Oh, yeah.
22	MR. SMRT: 65.
23	MR. ADKINS: 65. All right. Please be seated.
24	All of those opposed to the adjustment of the
25	budget, please stand or raise your hand. All those

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1	opposed, either please stand or raise your hand.
2	None? Any abstentions? One. Two. Where is the
3	other one? Oh, okay. Got you. All right. Thank
4	you.
5	The second one, this one will be tough, was to
6	the National Adjutant confirmation ballot, okay?
7	Patriot Charles W. "Chuck" Adkins volunteered to
8	serve as the 2023, 2024 National Adjutant. And per
9	Article 11, Duties of the National Officer, Section
10	1, National Commander, Paragraph E1, the National
11	Executive Committee must confirm the appointment.
12	There were three voting choices. Yes to
13	approve, no to disapprove, three to abstain. A
14	ballot of 77 voting members of the National
15	Executive Committee was conducted from 2 to 5
16	October 2023, to approve or disapprove the
17	confirmation of Patriot Adkins as the National
18	Adjutant. Of the 44 ballots received of let's
19	see, 44 excuse me, okay, 47 ballots received, 44
20	voted yes to approve, two voted no, and one
21	abstained. Okay. The tellers were Shar Gatlin, the
22	chief of staff of Montana, Douglas Middleton,
23	Delegate from Georgia, and Deron Santiny, at that
24	time, was the Senior Vice of Louisiana.
25	Do we have a motion to either approve or

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1	disapprove the National Adjutant Ballot
2	confirmation?
3	MR. MIDDLETON: National Adjutant Doug
4	Middleton, Delegate from Georgia. I move that we
5	approve the vote of the NEC for the appointment of
6	the National Adjutant.
7	MR. ADKINS: Thank you, sir.
8	MR. J. ANDERSON: Jim Anderson. I second.
9	MR. ADKINS: All right. We have a first and
10	second. Is there any discussion? Any discussion?
11	Any discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor of
12	approving the NEC's ballot to confirm the National
13	Adjutant appointment, please stand or raise your
14	hand.
15	MR. WITT: 68.
16	MR. ADKINS: Thank you. Please be seated. All
17	those in favor of rejecting or disapproving the
18	ballot, please stand or raise your hand. Okay. Any
19	disapprovals? Seeing none. All those who abstain?
20	One? Okay. One.
21	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Two.
22	MR. ADKINS: Where is the other one?
23	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Jack Hanson.
24	MR. ADKINS: Oh. Okay. It keeps doing that.
25	Can't see it for some reason. All right. So we

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have two. All right. 1 2 The next one was the confirmation on the 3 Legislative Officer. We had to appoint a new one because of the resignation of Brian Ore. So then, 4 5 past National Commander James McCormick volunteered 6 to step up. And as of 70 -- a ballot was sent to 7 the 77 voting members of the National Executive 8 Committee, which was conducted 20 to 30 November 9 2023, to approve or disapprove the confirmation of 10 PNC McCormick as the National Legislative Director. 11 Of the 39 ballots that were received, 32 voted 12 yes to approve, three voted no, and four abstained. 13 The tellers were once again, Shar Gatlin, Chief of 14 Staff at Department of Montana, Delegate Douglas 15 Middleton, Department of Georgia, and Deron Santiny, 16 the then Senior Vice Commander of the Department of 17 Louisiana. Do I have a motion from the floor? 18 MR. MIDDLETON: Patriot Adjutant Doug 19 Middleton, Delegate from Georgia. I move that the 20 Supreme Body approve the vote of the NEC to confirm our new National --21 22 MR. ADKINS: Legislative. 23 MR. MIDDLETON: -- Legislative Director. 24 MR. J. ANDERSON: Jim Anderson. I second.

MR. ADKINS: Okay. Any discussion? Yes, sir.

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1	MR. ABBEY: Ed Abbey, Parliamentarian.
2	Administrative note. The title for Shar Gatlin
3	would be National Chief of Staff for the State of
4	Montana. There is no Department of Montana.
5	MR. ADKINS: Thank you for the correction. Yes,
6	sir. Okay. Thanks, Ed.
7	MR. ABBEY: You're welcome.
8	MR. ADKINS: Okay. All in favor of confirming
9	PNC McCormick as the National Legislative Director,
10	please stand or raise your hand.
11	MR. WITT: Keep your hands up.
12	MR. ADKINS: He's got the badge. Keep your
13	hands up.
14	MR. WITT: Keep your hands up.
15	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton, Arizona. Vote
16	to approve.
17	MR. ADKINS: Thank you, Patriot Leighton.
18	MR. WITT: 64.
19	MR. ADKINS: Okay. 64 with Patriot Leighton.
20	All right. All those who are not in favor and vote
21	to disapprove or reject PNC McCormick as the
22	Legislative, please stand or raise your hand.
23	Seeing none. Any abstentions? One. Thanks. Okay.
24	It passes.
25	All right. The next one was the Military of

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the Purple Heart, an association of the United 1 2 States Army affiliate partnership program. The 3 Military Order of the Purple Heart, the Order, 4 negotiated with the AUSA to form a partnership at no 5 cost to the Order or any of its members, where our 6 veteran members, regardless of the military branch 7 in which they served, can benefit from products and 8 programs offered by either AUSA or through it.

9 Okay. The partnership helped formulate a 10 cohesive message with AUSA, providing a louder voice 11 on Capitol Hill, like when we went to the march on 12 the hill, as we advocate for legislation, which is 13 important to us and our fellow veterans. Okay. 14 Even though there was no cost to the Order, the 15 bylaws require that all contracts or agreements be 16 reviewed by the National Finance Committee, the 17 National Judge Advocate, and make recommendations to 18 the voting members.

Both the Judge Advocate and the NFC recommended approval. Okay. The NEC voted to approve because out of the 77 ballots sent out from 18 to 22 November of 2023, of the 38 received, 31 voted yes to approve, two voted no, and five had abstained. The tellers were Patriot Shar Gatlin, National Chief of Staff of the Department of Montana, Delegate Doug



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1	Middleton from the Department of Georgia, and Deron
2	Santiny, the then Senior Vice of the Department of
3	Louisiana. Do I have a motion from the floor to
4	regarding the affiliate program?
5	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate from
6	Georgia, who still is capable of standing. I move
7	that we approve the vote of the NEC for the
8	affiliation with USAA; is that right? AUSA
9	pardon me, AUSA, the Supreme Body approve that vote.
10	MR. ADKINS: Thank you, sir.
11	MR. MIDDLETON: I'm trying not to trip over my
12	baggage.
13	MR. ADKINS: Yeah.
14	MR. J. ANDERSON: Jim Anderson. I second.
15	MR. ADKINS: Okay. All right. All those in
16	favor to approve the affiliated partnership between
17	the MOPH and AUSA, please stand or raise your hand
18	to vote.
19	MR. J. ANDERSON: Point of order, sir.
20	MR. ADKINS: Patriot Anderson.
21	MR. J. ANDERSON: Yes. Jim Anderson. Call for
22	a discussion.
23	MR. ADKINS: Oh, yes. You're right. Any
24	discussion? My apologies.
25	MR. SEGUIN: I just had a question. This is

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1	Shawn Seguin, Patriot out of Chapter 455 in
2	Pittsburgh. My question involving the AUSA, which
3	I'm not against, is did we provide them an e-mail
4	list of our members? Because I started getting e-
5	mails having never actually signed up with them.
6	And if so, who approved to giving out our contact
7	information to another organization?
8	MR. ADKINS: Okay. Yes. We as part of the
9	agreement, we were required to provide AUSA the
10	contact list. And that was approved by the
11	leadership. And it was also part of the ballot
12	that, you know, because it was all sent out, and
13	that was approved by the NEC as what you know,
14	which is also our leadership. It's our governing
15	board. So yes, that was done.
16	Now, if you do not want to receive those e-
17	mails in the future, you know, you can go in your e-
18	mail, and you can block them.
19	MR. FERGUSON: And they also have the
20	unsubscribe
21	MR. ADKINS: Yeah. And they have the
22	unsubscribe button.
23	MR. SEGUIN: Thank you.
24	MR. ADKINS: You're welcome, sir. Recognize
25	Patriot Abbey? Now he's doing the karaoke.
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1	MR. ABBEY: So many of you have raised the
2	issue at one time or another with new potential
3	members. And they always hit you with the same,
4	what's in it for me? If you go to the AUSA's
5	website and look up member benefits, if, over a
6	lifetime, they can't get their \$200 back in spades,
7	they're not using anything. This is everything from
8	travel discounts, free SAT assistance for your
9	children, your grandchildren. There are
10	possibilities beyond limited. What happened to
11	trigger this response was, as a member, I get the
12	almost weekly, have you used this benefit?
13	A contact was reached out to their director of
14	programs, and their board of governors had just
15	testified before Congress that they weren't doing
16	enough, and they wanted to create more
17	relationships. If you go to the members' affiliation
18	with AUSA, you will see we are not the only partner.
19	But we're the only one that branches all the
20	branches of service. And what was supposed to have
21	happened was every member would give an opt-out at
22	the beginning.
23	MR. ADKINS: Yes.
24	MR. ABBEY: Once the members don't respond to
25	that, then and only then would you start getting the

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1	solicitations. An additional membership benefit of
2	this will be as a member of AUSA, you will be able
3	to attend their meetings as a member. You will also
4	be able to go to the symposiums. We will be able to
5	exhibit at their meetings. We will be able to get a
6	better outreach than we've ever had before. And we
7	go up on their page as a partner. So we get free
8	advertisement every time that somebody hits their
9	website. So with that, I will humbly move back into
10	my quiet spot.

11 MR. ADKINS: And I want to thank Patriot Abbey 12 because he was our lead on putting this all 13 together, and he did a great job, so -- and he is 14 correct. Because you're now a member, you can go to 15 their symposium. And I look forward to running with 16 you all in the AUSA ten-mile. Yeah. That's the one 17 in October. All right. Patriot Everston.

18 MR. EVERSTON: Patriot Ed. Patriot Ed. This 19 question is for you. With the AUSA, I guess who --20 Patriot Ed, this question is to you, since you are 21 the connection between the two. With that said, are 22 we allowed to -- because they have one of the 23 largest conferences in the country that's coming up 24 in Washington, D.C. I know one of them is in 25 Washington, D.C. Are we to have a display and show

19 tally, we had about 30 38 or 39 votes returned	≥d.
20 MR. ADKINS: Yes, sir.	
21 MR. MIDDLETON: That's about a 50 percent	
22 return rate. Every department commander in here	e is
23 a member of the NEC, as are other elected office	ers
and such. And to think that on issues that show	ıld
25 be very important, that we actually require	

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1	ratification by the Supreme Body at a convention,
2	that we can only get 50 percent of the people doing
3	what I consider their part of their duties in their
4	position, is abyssal.
5	And I I know there have been comments and
6	maybe even will, again, be comments this year about
7	bylaws and such, about eliminating the Finance
8	Committee members as voting members of the NEC, and
9	the Publications Committee as voting members of the
10	NEC. Yes, there's four votes in each of those
11	committees. But if half of roughly half of the
12	other members of the NEC don't take the time to even
13	turn in a ballot by e-mail, is abysmal.
14	MR. ADKINS: Yeah. Yeah. ElectionBuddy is
15	really easy to use. Any further comment? Any
16	further comments? Hearing none, all in favor of
17	ratifying the MOPH and AUSA affiliate partnership,
18	please stand or raise your hand.
19	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton. I vote to
20	approve.

MR. ADKINS: Okay. Thanks, Larry. 21 22 MR. WITT: Okay. You can put your hands down. 23 MR. ADKINS: Yes. Yes, sir? 24 69. MR. WITT: 25 MR. ADKINS: I'm sorry?



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1	MR. WITT: 69.
2	MR. ADKINS: 69. It'll be 70 counting Patriot
3	Leighton. All right. Yeah. All those who vote to
4	reject or disapprove the affiliation with AUSA,

6	one. Okay. All those who abstain, please either
7	stand or raise your hand. One, two, three, four.
8	Okay. Thank you very much. The motion passes.
9	All right. We've only got two more, so bear
10	with me. All right. The next one was the PCI
11	history project program. The Order was approached
12	by the Publishing Concepts International, PCI, to
13	publish an oral history book along with the digital
14	versions of our membership that we've done in the
15	past, which, you know, featured our membership and
16	had initiatives. And, you know, they provided a
17	gratuity. But it took them two years to get it to
18	us.
19	All right. The agreement from PCI sought the
20	Order's participation. And pursuant to the bylaws,
21	the National Finance Committee assessed the
22	agreement and did not recommend approval. In
23	addition, the National Judge Advocate reviewed the
24	contract, and while he deemed it legally sufficient,
25	he found it to favor more PCI than it did the Order.

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1	All right. A ballot of the 77 voting members
2	of the National Executive Committee was conducted 5
3	to 9 February. All right. The number required for
4	a quorum was 26. All right. The National Commander
5	appointed the following as the tellers: Doug
6	Middleton, Delegate from the Department of Georgia,
7	Deron Santiny, the then Senior Vice of Louisiana,
8	and Shar Gatlin, the National Chief of Staff of the
9	State of Montana. Only 23 eligible members of NEC
10	cast a vote. Therefore, the measure failed. Okay.
11	All right. All in favor of and in this case,
12	it's a little tricky. So somebody is going to have
13	to help me. All right. In this case, we would be
14	ratifying the failure of the ballot. You know, in
15	other words, we're disapproving the contract with
16	PCI. Okay.
17	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate from
18	Georgia. I'm not sure we even did vote on that
19	since it was disapproved. There's really nothing to
20	ratify.
21	MR. ADKINS: Okay. All right. Patriot
22	Anderson, you had a comment? Okay. Moving on. The
23	last one was the second adjustment to the budget.
24	That was the transfer of some of the VAB investment
25	funds. And it was during a meeting of the National

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1	Finance Committee held on Thursday, the 1st of
2	February. A motion was made by NFC member Jim
3	Anderson to transfer \$30,000 from the Veterans
4	Affairs Service, VABS investment account, into the
5	2023, 2024 operating budget.
6	And the funds would be broken out and placed in
7	the following budgetary lines. \$15,000 was
8	deposited into the scholarship restricted bank
9	account to replenish the \$15,000 expense in
10	scholarships this year. 5,000 was to be allocated to
11	the to the educational software instruction
12	classes. 5,000 went to the suicide awareness
13	program. 5,000 was to be allocated to cover the
14	line item for the VABS program. Per Patriot Dennis
15	Wallot, chair of both the National Finance and
16	Investment Committees, there was more than
17	sufficient funds in the VABS investment account to
18	cover the request. The voting members of the NFC
19	recommended the National Executive Committee approve
20	the transfer. Okay. The members were National
21	Commander Carder Ferguson, National Finance
22	Committee Chair Dennis Wallot, NFC member Paul
23	Picker, and NFC member Jim Anderson, and NFC member
24	Craig Warthog Wertheim.
25	In accordance with the bylaws, the National

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1	Committee Section, Duties of the National Finance
2	Committee, the NEC was required to, you know,
3	approve any adjustments to the budget. A ballot was
4	sent to the 77 voting members of the NEC, conducted
5	12 to 16 February 2024, to approve or disapprove the
6	adjustments to the 2023, 2024 budget. The quorum
7	required was 26. Okay. Out of the out of the 43
8	ballots that were cast, 34 voted to approve, five
9	voted to disapprove, and four had abstained. All
10	right. The Commander appointed the following as the
11	tellers: Delegate Doug Middleton from the Department
12	of Georgia, Patriot Deron Santiny, the then Senior
13	Vice of the Department of Louisiana, and Patriot
14	Shar Gatlin, the National Chief of Staff for the
15	state of Montana. Do I have a motion to approve or
16	disapprove the adjustment the second adjustment
17	to the 2023, 2024 budget?
18	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate from
19	Georgia. I move that the Supreme Body approve the
20	vote of the NEC to make the budget adjustment that
21	they voted affirmative.
22	MR. ADKINS: Thank you, sir. Patriot Anderson.
23	MR. J. ANDERSON: Jim Anderson. I second the
24	motion.
25	MR. ADKINS: All right. We have a first and

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1	second. Do we have any discussion? Anybody need to
2	make comments? Anybody have concerns? Any
3	discussion? Any discussion? Hearing none, all those
4	in favor of approving the NEC action of adjusting
5	the budget, please stand or raise your hand. Keep
6	your hand up. Yes, sir. Did Patriot Leighton? Is
7	Patriot Leighton still on? Did he
8	MR. LEIGHTON: Yeah. I'm on.
9	MR. ADKINS: Okay. So I'll add one. Okay.
10	Okay. All right. Anybody who wants to vote to
11	reject or disapprove, please either stand or raise
12	your hand. All right. One. Anybody who wants to
13	disapprove or reject, please stand or raise your
14	hand. All right one. All right. Any abstentions?
15	One, two. All right.
16	Thank you, Patriots. That was the last one.
17	Thank you for your patience and your deliberations.
18	I now yield to the National Commander.
19	MR. FERGUSON: Actually, I was trying to see
20	what time that we can have a break. That's why
21	we actually will have some snacks at break. But I
22	had to coordinated with the Department of Florida to
23	see when they're going to get some stuff out there.
24	So I wasn't going to break this early, but just for
25	a few minutes. But it sounded like we may have to

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1	wait until he gives me the coordination on that, so
2	oh, we're good? Okay. I got the thumbs up. That
3	was right there. So first thing is, we'll take a
4	break. We'll get back in here about probably
5	about 10:15. What I would like for us to do is
6	remember what we just went through. This was a
7	preliminary coming up with the bylaw, so that was a
8	practice. Okay. So that way you got an idea of
9	what's going on.

10 So as we open up the prayer, I appreciate each 11 and every one of you as the time goes on, and I'm 12 enjoying myself. I am enjoying myself. I -- I want 13 to ask you as a body to pray for my -- my wife. She 14 is recovering from two back surgeries, although 15 she's upstairs now, but she needs some prayer. And 16 there might be others that are in that sort of realm 17 also. So let us pray.

Dear Heavenly Father, we thank you, Lord, for this time of gathering. As I related to the PTSD, this is a thera -- therapeutic type of atmosphere, fellowshipping with our friends, those that have been in harm's way and have come through with stories to tell, and just a time of letting loose. NICKEL: Sir? 9 MR. ADKINS: Yes. 10 MR. NICKEL: You missed Idaho. 11 MR. ADKINS: Oh, my apologies. Commander, 12 Department of Idaho, George Nickel. MR. NICKEL: Senior Vice. 13 14 MR. ADKINS: All right. And state your name, 15 sir. 16 MR. NICKEL: George Nickel, Senior Vice, 17 Department of Idaho. 18 MR. ADKINS: Okay. Thank you. I couldn't hear 19 you, so thanks. All right. Back to Region 4. 20 Francis Figueroa, North Carolina. 21 MS. FIGUEROA: Francis Figueroa, Region 4 22 Commander, present. 23 MR. ADKINS: All right. I think I'm just going 24 to say, Department of Alabama, anybody here? 25 MS. FIGUEROA: Absent.

20	MR. ADKINS: Department of North Carolina?
21	MR. LAZZARA: Lenny Lazzara, Department of
22	North Carolina.
23	MR. ADKINS: Department of South Carolina?
24	MR. LOPEZ: Department Commander Carl Lopez,
25	South Carolina.

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MR. ADKINS: Hoo-ah. And Department of the 1 Caribbean? 2 3 MS. FIGUEROA: Absent. 4 MR. ADKINS: Okay. Next region, start lining 5 Region 5 Commander? up. 6 MR. WITTSCHACK: Gus Wittschack, Commander, 7 Region 5. 8 MR. ADKINS: All right. Arkansas, Department of Arkansas? 9 10 MR. EZEAGWULA : Ezeagwula, Sergeant-at-Arms, 11 Arkansas. 12 MR. ADKINS: Department of Colorado? MR. WITT: Should be online. 13 14 MR. 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MR. ARNOLD: Present. 1 2 MR. ADKINS: Okay. We're good to go. And then 3 Department of Virginia? 4 MR. KING: Ben King, Commander, present. 5 MR. ADKINS: Thank you. All right. MR. GRAY: National Adjutant Keith Gray, 6 7 Credentials. Need some clarifications for voting. 8 MR. ADKINS: Okay. 9 MR. GRAY: I need to clarify Department 10 Commander of Florida. Is he voting as Department 11 Commander of Florida or as the Finance Committee? 12 MR. WERTHEIM: Florida. 13 MR. GRAY: Okay. Same with Finance Officer. 14 Are you voting as Finance Officer or past National 15 Commander? 16 MR. RIVERA: Finance Officer. 17 MR. GRAY: And then the last one I need is 18 Are you voting as the Department of Georgia. 19 Georgia or the National Publication Committee? 20 MR. ADKINS: Alan? Can you ask him? 21 MR. GIBSON: Yes. I will -- I will vote for 22 Georgia. 23 MR. GRAY: Okay. 24 MR. ADKINS: Thank you, sir. All right. I 25 yield back to the National Committee -- oh, I take

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1	that back. Are we going to him? I yield to the
2	Senior Vice Chairman of the Bylaws Committee.
3	MR. HANSON: Department of Iowa Commander Jack
4	Hanson. I take exception of the National Adjutant
5	showing favoritism. When South Carolina said they
6	were present, he went hoo-ah. Thank you.
7	MR. FERGUSON: Point taken. I'll do this.
8	Patriot Hansen, hold your hand out. There you go.
9	MR. HANSON: Use the big hand.
10	MR. FERGUSON: No. I got to make sure the hand
11	works later.
12	MR. RIVERA: PNC Rivera. I want to clarify
13	something. Yesterday I had made a motion on a vote,
14	and there was some questions regarding that vote
15	that was passed by the Body. And I don't what
16	the vote was passed for was, we currently have a
17	\$304,000 in an account of money that's there that
18	has been being sent up out of our life member rebate
19	to National to utilize. And it's piled up to
20	\$304,000.
21	The vote the motion that I made, which
22	passed, was to pay a second rebate. The current
23	rebate is approximately \$209,000. That's the
24	chapters' and departments'. So the vote was for a
25	second rebate for that amount of 209,000. That is

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our money that is in that account because we've been sending it to National.

So to clarify that, the vote for that -- and I 3 4 know that there were some questions regarding that, 5 and if we need to redo it -- if people think that we 6 shouldn't do it or should do it, we could redo the 7 vote because there's been questions about it. But I 8 wanted to make very clear that the money is not 9 coming from the Life Member rebate. It's coming 10 from an account that -- the money is sitting in that 11 account right now, which we have been sending to 12 National over the last few years.

13 MR. ABBEY: National Adjutant, Ed Abbey, Parliamentarian. I'm the burr under the saddle. 14 Ι 15 stated, for the record, that the motion was not 16 passed with a monetary amount and, therefore, you 17 know -- you know, it needed clarification. All of 18 you that have signed warrants understand that if you 19 pass a motion that does not have a financial amount, 20 it creates a, you know, invalid warrant. And that's 21 the last thing we need to do, is come back a year 22 later and say, why didn't we get the money? So I 23 wanted clarification. And yes, if they want to bring 24 the motion back up, I have no objection. I just 25 needed clarification that the motion was without a



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1	finance amount.
2	MR. OLIVAREZ: Would you guys like to bring the
3	motion back up?
4	AUDIENCE: Yes.
5	MR. OLIVAREZ: Yes? Okay. I will.
6	MR. RIVERA: PNC Rivera. I make a motion that
7	we pay a second rebate of approximately 209,000.
8	Currently, there is a money in the bank. We have
9	a the there's \$304,000 in a bank account that
10	is not included in the current budget. That money
11	we have been paying 60 percent to National to
12	utilize that money. The money has not been used.
13	That is our money that we've been sending to them.
14	I make a motion that we pay a second rebate to the
15	departments and the chapters of approximately
16	209,000.
17	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate from
18	Georgia, second.
19	MR. OLIVAREZ: Any discussion?
20	MR. FERGUSON: National Commander, thank you,
21	from the floor. Only discussion I got about this
22	is, do we know what the next couple of years' budget
23	is going to be and what we're going to get in with
24	money? I don't have a problem that we give money
25	out to the departments, but one of the things we

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1	need to look at is, how we're going to this year,
2	we got the budget covered for what's going to cover
3	for next year.
4	So having that money, giving it down to the
5	departments or to chapters, that's 209,000 that we
6	divide out. What is the next year's budget going to
7	be for that? So that would be my only question
8	that's on that. Looking for the future where we got
9	if we can keep that and take that money and maybe
10	invest it to make sure we get it for the next year.
11	So that's about my only thought of that.
12	MR. OLIVAREZ: Patriot Smrt.
13	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Patriot, Kentucky Chapter 146
14	vote. Is there a delta there? If yes, we now have
15	a fixed 209 initial and a duplicate 209. Is there a
16	delta of what funds are still in the general funds
17	that were Life Membership Funds dispersed under the
18	60-20-20 plan? And if so, why aren't, you know, the
19	remaining balance of that returned to the Life
20	Membership Fund so that it can build up, obviously,
21	the fund, the principle. And then we can have that
22	invested. It what is the difference? You first
23	said 309,000.
24	MR. RIVERA: 209 approximately 209.
25	MR. SMRT: 209.

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1	MR. RIVERA: Yeah. National Finance Officer
2	Rivera. There is a bank account currently that has
3	\$304,000 in the account that has been pushed over.
4	Each year they've spent less and less. That money
5	was provided to National in the 60 percent. It was
6	not utilized. And so that money is there that's our
7	money that we sent and gave to National. And my
8	my motion was to provide that money back to us in a
9	second rebate.
10	MR. SMRT: And what is remaining in that
11	general fund that is still part of that 60? That's
12	what I really want to hear a number of.
13	MR. RIVERA: Oh, 100,000.
14	MR. SMRT: And why is it remaining there? Is
15	it a slush fund? Is it a rainy day fund?
16	MR. RIVERA: It's not a slush fund. It's not a
17	slush fund at all.
18	MR. SMRT: I know it's in general accounting.
19	MR. RIVERA: Right. It's a it's the general
20	account.
21	MR. SMRT: All right. Thank you.
22	MR. FERGUSON: Patriot Abbey?
23	MR. ABBEY: You're all going to throw rocks at
24	me, and I'm ready for it, but I would really like
25	you to understand. We can vote this, but we just

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1	talked earlier in this convention about the fact
2	that while we can pay ourselves, we're talking about
3	trying to go ahead and improve our non-profit image
4	across the board.

5 I would much rather you consider that we could, 6 you know, vote against this motion. And yes, it 7 might not be paying ourselves, but if we can have 8 that money then sent to other programs that have 9 either been underfunded or have not even been 10 brought to life yet, we can have that money to 11 improve our credit ratings with the nonprofits so 12 when we do go asking the people with deep pockets 13 for more money in the future, we have a legal leg to 14 stand on. Thank you. 15 MR. ADKINS: Jim Anderson. Pay attention. 16 MR. OLIVAREZ: Patriot Anderson. 17 MR. T. ANDERSON: Patriot Anderson speaking for 18 the fund --19 MR. OLIVAREZ: Right behind you. Right behind 20 you, Terry -- Jim Anderson, sorry. 21 MR. T. ANDERSON: Sorry, Jim. 22 MR. J. ANDERSON: That's all right, Terry. Jim 23 Anderson, National Finance Committee. Currently in 24 the general bank account for the order, there's 25 277,000, as of this morning when I looked. The



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1	209,000 that Ernie is suggesting is coming from the
2	Life Membership rebate. The Life Membership rebate
3	currently right now is 514,000. Out of that, 40
4	percent is 209,000 that goes to the department and
5	chapters. The balance goes to National
6	headquarters.

7 He's suggesting to take it out of the general fund, another 209,000, and submit it back out as a 8 9 second distribution to departments and chapters. Ιf 10 we do that, and I ran some figures last night, at 11 the end of 2025, we could have -- if no other 12 expenses pop up, we could have 342,000 rough figures 13 left in the bank account if we do not distribute that 209,000 out. If we distribute that 209,000 14 out, it's going to leave us a little over 100,000. 15

16 There are possibilities of some expenses that 17 we do not know that we're going to get hit with from 18 the IRS because of the 990s for prior years not 19 being filed. They're being worked on now to try and 20 get them together to get them filed, but the IRS can 21 come back and penalize us. So keep that in mind.

22 I, you know -- yeah, if the money is there. But 23 yet, we could end up having problems later down the 24 line. I would rather see that money distributed out 25 into the programs that the Order is supposed to be



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1	doing. Thank you.
2	MR. OLIVAREZ: Patriot Terry Anderson.
3	MR. T. ANDERSON: Terry Anderson, Vice Chair of
4	the fund. One of our problems is the rating that we
5	have that donations or donors look at. And we are
6	small. We need funds to help, like, with suicide
7	awareness and other programs that we have within the
8	Order. Using some of that money would help us
9	visibly with donations down the road.
10	And I agree with Ed, and I agree with Jim. I
11	don't think we should be giving it back. We don't
12	really need it in the chapters. There's very few
13	chapters that really need the funds. And I think it
14	would do us a better job down the road. Thank you.
15	MR. OLIVAREZ: Go ahead, Patriot.
16	MR. SEGUIN: Patriot Shawn Seguin. There's a
17	lot of stuff going on. I'm going to try to stick
18	with my main point because I just got tons of stuff
19	that I agree with it, but I don't know how to say
20	it. So I'm going to stick with what I was saying.
21	I agree with the man with the glorious goatee
22	that was up here before. I've been with a lot of
23	non-profits. I've worked at the DAV, VFW. All of
24	them have programs, and the program spends where
25	we're actually getting out there and taking care of

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the veterans. Our overhead -- I was at the finance meeting yesterday, sat in on it. It is on the high end. 3

We are not on the charity rater right now. 4 We 5 keep bringing that up. The foundation is on the 6 thing right now. We haven't even gotten to get 7 reestablished on it yet. To be reestablished, we 8 need to spend money on our veterans. We need to be 9 spending money on our purple heart recipients that are in need. 10

11 So that 209,000, I would 100 percent agree that 12 it needs to be utilized and not just sitting in the 13 fund because we need to get our faces back out in 14 the public so they know that the Military of the Purple Heart is the organization to take care of 15 16 Purple Heart recipients -- not the number two, not 17 the number three. Purple Harbor recipients should be 18 calling us first.

19 So I believe that, yes, those funds 100 percent 20 should be allocated back out. I just don't 21 necessarily think that going to the departments or 22 the chapters is the right mentality because we do 23 have programs. \$5,000, God bless it, for suicide 24 awareness for a national organization. Hey, it's a 25 start. I'm not knocking on it for what it was. But

1	that's a drop in the pool when you think nationwide,
2	right? We just divide that by 50 states we're down
3	to quite a little, right?
4	So I fully think that, yes, it should be, you
5	know, voted down. But then in place of that, we
6	should look at transferring those funds out to our
7	programs so we can get out there and take care of
8	some veterans.
9	MR. OLIVAREZ: Thank you. Patriot Middleton.
10	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate from
11	Georgia.
12	MR. OLIVAREZ: It's not on. Turn it on and
13	get a
14	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate from
15	Georgia. I think we may be confusing apples and
16	oranges here. The MOPH Fund is a 501(c)(3). And
17	yes, you need to look at Charity Navigator and
18	GuideStar and other places to see what the rating
19	is. But the Order is a 501(c)(19), I believe it is,
20	which is different.
21	The money that we're talking about is from the
22	501(c)(19), which is a Veteran Service Organization.
23	That money so you would have to transfer money
24	from the organization to the MOPH Fund, and you
25	don't want to do that. You're that's acting in

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1	reverse. The MOPH Fund was established to support
2	the Order, not the Order to support the fund.
3	MR. OLIVAREZ: Patriot Wetzel.
4	MR. WETZEL: Yes. Raymond Wetzel, Department
5	of California, Senior Vice. Yes, our chapter could
6	use the money. However, a point was brought up
7	yesterday. If we're going to start transferring
8	money, as it was stated yesterday, our excuse me,
9	our auxiliary needs it more than anything else, and
10	really within that, they're a big support of us.
11	So I would reiterate what was said yesterday. I
12	feel if we're going to start dispersing money and
13	taking money and putting it back, I would say we
14	would up that because a comment was made of \$30,000.
15	I I would I would up that to a \$100,000 for
16	the auxiliary to be able to be here and support our
17	veterans at these conventions.
18	MR. WALLOT: That \$30,000 for the lineage
19	auxiliary, that was just to cover their convention
20	expense. Dennis Wallot, Chairman of National
21	Finance Committee. And then pass on the floor.
22	MR. OLIVAREZ: Thank you. Patriot Smrt.
23	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Delegate, Kentucky. I want to
24	reorient everybody's focus. These are Life
25	Membership Funds. Okay. By the bylaws, those were

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1	supposed to be sacrosanct principle, and we were
2	only supposed to disperse in interest on that in
3	order for the Life Membership rebate. I checked my
4	pockets. I checked everything else. Someone stole
5	the keys to the good idea books, and they're running
6	around right now.
7	Life Membership Funds were tapped. And
8	unfortunately we lost a 6 million principle and had
9	been drawn down over multiple years, secured loans
10	versus unsecured loans in past administrations.
11	This is not the Order's money. It is the membership
12	money that was sacrosanct and only supposed to be
13	invested and distributed back before the bylaws'
14	five-year sunset for 50-50 chapter and department.
15	The commanders, and the potential next year
16	commander, must submit budgets and run their
17	programs.
18	Apples and oranges, guys. Life Membership
19	Funds were never intended to be the piggy bank for
20	the Order. We only did that as an emergency because
21	we lost the Foundation's support. We created
22	another 501(c)(3), separate entities. Do not
23	confuse the two. Do not co- mingle.
24	The monies that we were promised that was
25	desperate 60-20-20 for five years, and it sunsets in

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1	'25, was to help operate the headquarters.
2	Surprising to a number of us, they didn't use it.
3	They didn't need it. But they didn't tell us they
4	were squirreling it away.
5	It is not the Order's fund. It is the
6	Membership Life member fund monies. And those were
7	always dedicated or adjusted to support the chapters
8	and the departments, and under the current bylaws,
9	allowed for five years to do 60-20-20
10	MR. RIVERA: PNC Rivera requests to speak one
11	more time.
12	MR. OLIVAREZ: Request to have a PNC Rivera
13	speak for a second time. All approved?
14	AUDIENCE: Aye.
15	MR. OLIVAREZ: Any nays? All right. Go ahead.
16	MR. RIVERA: PNC Rivera. So this money is our
17	money that I was National Commander when this was
18	passed to give 60 percent to the headquarters. It
19	passed at my convention. My year, we had to borrow
20	400- and-something-thousand dollars. It's paid back
21	now. So that year is taken care of.
22	This is our rebate money that we gave to
23	National to utilize. When I came back in as the
24	National Finance Officer, and we got everything
25	straightened out, there's \$304,000. There's 255,000

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1	in the bank account. And there's another 60,000 in
2	an escrow account. There's \$304,000 that's
3	available that is our money that has been rolling
4	over. I'm just asking you to support to give our
5	rebate money back, a few years late, back to us.
6	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton, National
7	Publication Chair.
8	MR. OLIVAREZ: What did he say?
9	MR. FERGUSON: Go ahead, Larry Leighton.
10	MR. LEIGHTON: This is Larry. This is two
11	points. One, Charity Navigator does not rate
12	501(c)(19)
13	MR. FERGUSON: Just a second. Tell him to hold
14	a minute. Okay. Go ahead, Larry.
15	MR. LEIGHTON: Two points. Number one, the
16	Charity Navigator that people are referring to only
17	rates 501(c)(3)s not 501(c)(19)s. That's why we're
18	not rated with Charity Navigators.
19	Second point, the money that came out of the
20	rebate was given to the national headquarters, not
21	necessarily for operations of the headquarters, but
22	the operations of the Order. The fact that it is
23	still sitting there is because program chairmans
24	have not submitted budgets. They have not submitted
25	a program that says, this is how we support our

veterans.

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If the suicide awareness or the women's veterans advocacy program chairs would submit a budget, that money would have been submitted. I submit that the money be saved there for the programs and not for the rebates for the chapters. Thank you.

8 MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. Thank you. Patriot 9 Leighton. It's National Commander again. I want to make sure everybody understands because I was 10 11 listening to the numbers that's out there. So I would 14 preserve, obviously, the right to be able to say 15 that it seems to me a little too sketchy by half. 16 Not imputing anybody's character, but if you 17 are going to make changes to a particular 18 independent committee, you better coordinate ahead 19 of time. Do your due diligence. And work in 20 cooperation with them before you try to rule them by

21 bylaw at a later date.

MR. OLIVAREZ: Thank you. Patriot Middleton. MR. MIDDLETON: Middleton, Delegate from Georgia. I believe we've got a cart before the horse. And I don't think there's even been a motion

25	We have always set a high-priced capital

1 expenditure. That's been \$10,000 in the past -- for 2 the last 20 years that I've been in this position. 3 The extra day coming in the night before, since our 4 expenses are no longer reimbursed, would be added 5 expenses to the committee as well as anyone else 6 that would want to get involved with it. And to 7 have a meeting every two months, according to this, 8 we have a managed fund. That means we pay a fund 9 manager to do this.

10 We have no control over that. If we -- they 11 buy 38 shares of Tesla and 52 shares of McDonald's, 12 we can't jump in there and give them our percent --13 we can give them our we want to have an 80/20 14 portfolio, 80 percent equities, 20 percent fixed. 15 So we really have no control over the monies that 16 are involved with this, except for a small portion 17 that goes back and forth and in and out of the 18 checking account, which is basically a transfer.

Everything else on here, it seems, even though I was not the consulted or no one on the committee was even consulted, all of these pertaining to the Finance Committee, it seems like it's an overdone -someone that does not know anything about this committee and the way it operates are making the laws for it. And if you follow the Supreme Court at

18	the Commander, who has command authority, whomever
19	he or she shall be, and assumes that the Adjutant
20	and appointed member has the same level of
21	actionable, you know, review.
22	And that's not the job of the adjutant to keep
23	control or tallies of this. This is impossible to
24	actually enforce, much less put into the bylaws.
25	And I urge you strongly to drop this and vote for

1	disapproval.
2	MS. FIGUEROA: McIntosh.
3	MR. OLIVAREZ: No. Wetzel. Wetzel.
4	MS. FIGUEROA: Wetzel.
5	MR. WETZEL: Yes. Raymond Wetzel, Senior Vice,
6	California, Bylaws Committee. I'm sorry, I disagree
7	with everyone. Everyone here is a volunteer. You
8	have stepped up to the plate to accept a position,
9	and one of your jobs is to vote, as pointed out
10	earlier. And if you can't do that, then step down.
11	And if you don't want to step down, then this
12	section needs to be taken care of, if you don't want
13	to do your job.
14	So I believe that this should be passed and
15	held up held these hold these commanders that
16	are not voting are for whatever reason,
17	responsible. And if you don't want to do the job,
18	then get the hell out. Sorry.
19	MS. FIGUEROA: Siebels.
20	MR. SIEBELS: Siebels, PNC. In accordance with
21	Robert's Rules, this vote has to be known because
22	it's a conflict with its own bylaws. Where they're
23	going to assert this in the bylaws, if you read the
24	following paragraph sentence, it says, these
25	people will retain an NEC vote. You can't say you
1	don't have to vote because next paragraph you have
----	--
2	voters. It has to be legally voted down.
3	MS. FIGUEROA: Online?
4	MR. KROPTAVICH: Okay. I have to agree with
5	Siebels here. This is a legal problem. Even if we
6	have the authority to do this, we have one major
7	issue: there's no way to restore the rights under
8	the way bylaw is written. So even if we wanted to
9	do it, we have not closed the loop. There needs to
10	be this is not actionable as-is. And as you know,
11	I have not reviewed this prior to the approval. So
12	I was not able to point that out. So then there
13	again, a couple weeks.
14	MR. ADKINS: Who was that?
15	MR. PRATTS: National Judge Advocate
16	MR. WITT: Judge Advocate

16 Second issue, we have a chain of custody of our	
17 department responsibilities. If a department	
18 commander is not present, the senior vice should be	
19 present. And that should not count as an unexcused	
20 absence on the commander if a duly appointed	
21 delegated replacement is available. You know, but	
22 it is a succession, I mean, because if you remove	
23 the Commander by succession, the senior vice would	
24 come in play.	
25 MR. PRATTS: Commander Ruben Pratts, Department

1	of New York. My issue is I'm one of those
2	neanderthals with this internet stuff. And I know
3	I've done votes because I know with Chuck, those
4	buddy votes. That I was able to do here. But I
5	can't do everything you guys want yet. I'm not an
6	intimate person, you know? That's my issue right
7	there. Thank you.
8	MS. FIGUEROA: Adjutant?
9	MR. ADKINS: Yeah. Chuck Adkins, National
10	Adjutant.
11	MR. MCINTOSH: Tell us about from the floor.
12	MR. ADKINS: From yeah, from the floor.
13	MR. MCINTOSH: Thank you.
14	MR. ADKINS: In terms of the who represents
15	the departments on the NEC, our bylaws state it is
16	only the department commander. The junior and
17	senior vice do not have an NEC vote. If they are
18	representing their departments here at the
19	convention, they don't get an NEC vote, but they do
20	get to vote from the floor on all other actions. So
21	I just wanted to make that clear. And that would
22	even be true during in between convention NEC
23	votes or actions.
24	MS. FIGUEROA: Historian McIntosh?
25	MR. MCINTOSH: Thank you. Where I have a major

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1	problem with this, everything everybody said about
2	trying to keep track of it would be a nightmare. We
3	have very few staff. Why burden them with
4	additional trying to keep track?
5	But, as far as I'm concerned, the one thing
6	that is the most damaging is the sentence that says,
7	"NEC members who will miss NEC meetings as defined
8	above shall obtain in advance a written excuse of
9	absence of either the National Commander or the
10	National Adjutant." Putting an appointed member to
11	grant or disapprove an excuse is beyond the pale, as
12	far as I'm concerned, because the adjutant is
13	appointed, not elected, and you put a non-elected
14	individual making decisions.
15	MS. FIGUEROA: We are going to withdraw this
16	amendment the resolution. No call for question.
17	The resolution will be withdrawn. Okay.
18	MR. MIDDLETON: Is that is that by the chair
19	of the Bylaws Committee?
20	MR. OLIVAREZ: Yes. Yes.
21	MR. MIDDLETON: Would you state that, please?
22	MS. FIGUEROA: By the chair of the Bylaws
23	Committee
24	MR. OLIVAREZ: By the chair I withdraw this
25	resolution as the chair of the Bylaws Committee.

1	MS. FIGUEROA: We will move on to the next
2	resolution, 2024-04-NFF, regarding e-mail and spam,
3	Article 12, National Committee, Section 2, Duties of
4	the National Executive Committee, Subsection I1D3
5	and Article 2, Membership Section 5, resolved that
6	Article 12, National Committees, Section 2, Duties
7	of the National Executive Committee, Subsection I1D
8	be amended by deleting Paragraph 3, the National
9	Adjutant, other MOPH officers, or members shall not
10	spam an NEC member's designated voting e-mail
11	address.
12	And be it further resolved that Article 2,
13	Membership Section 5, Membership Code of Conduct
14	shall be amended to read by adding "E, members
15	having a @purpleheart.org e-mail address shall only
16	use it for official MOPH business. F, embers,
17	associate members, or affiliates of the Military
18	Order of the Purple Heart USA, Inc., the Order,
19	shall not send spam or other unwarranted or
20	unsolicited, degrading or harmful correspondence,
21	including e-mails, to any members of the Order's
22	purpleheart.org e-mail and/or personal e-mail."
23	"Members who have received a request to stop send
24	to stop sending spam or other unwarranted or
25	solicited, degrading, or harmful correspondence,

1	including e-mails, and fails to do so shall be
2	subject to grievance under Article 15, Section 12,
3	and/or charges under Article 15, Section 13.
4	Reference, Merriam-Webster definition, spam:
5	unsolicited, usually commercial messages, such as e-
6	mails, text messages, or internet postings sent to a
7	large number of recipients or posted in a large
8	number of places."
9	MR. WERTHEIM: Craig Wertheim, Department of
10	Florida Commander. I make a motion to accept
11	Resolution number 2024-04-NFF.
12	MR. SMRT: Smrt, second.
13	MS. FIGUEROA: And for a second?
14	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky, second in order to
15	move us to discussion.
16	MS. FIGUEROA: Discussion? Smrt.
17	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky. I will repeat that
18	it's unwieldy, ham-handed, unenforceable. And
19	honestly, you know how much I love the microphone.
20	You how much I love my dulcet tone and voice. And
21	even when I deprive you of those docent tones by
22	sending e-mails, opinions, or things like that, who
23	is it that determines whether it's considered spam,
24	unwanted, unwarranted, or unsolicited? Who is it
25	that says I can't say something?

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1	If I had an official e-mail, I can understand
2	the limitations on that. Then I think that's
3	appropriate. If you're an officer with
4	purpleheart.org, understandable, decorum, and
5	everything else. If you are a member, God-given
6	right, First Amendment, you can say whatever you
7	want to say. I kindly encourage you not to be
8	incorrigible, not to be rude, not to be disparaging,
9	and not to be the total PTS A-holes that we have
10	normally embraced and usually execute on a regular
11	basis.
12	However, I can't control that, my wife can't
13	control that, and no one else seems to be able to
14	control that. But it is your right to be able to
15	address things. It's like petitioning your
16	representatives. They don't want to hear from you
17	except at election time. But our elected members,
18	or appointed members, or chairmans, or people who
19	are doing the work of the Order can't do it in
20	secret without reproval of people who are paying
21	attention.
22	They might not like it, but it is not
23	considered spam just because you are coming up on
24	the net and telling them that they are exercising
25	poor judgment. So I urge, you know, that you truly

Commander Wertheim. 4 MS. FIGUEROA: 5 MR. WERTHEIM: Commander Wertheim, Department 6 of Florida. This amendment only refers to those 7 having an @purple -- in reference to the members 8 having an @purpleheart.org e-mail that is given to 9 them by the national headquarters e-mail address. 10 So it's those that are issued the Purple Heart e-11 mail address by the Order for official business 12 only, which, by law, can be controlled because 13 they're using it on, quote unquote, "company time." 14 MR. SMRT: Point of order and correction. Smrt, 15 Kentucky. F is not about patriot.org [sic]. It 16 said, any members, associate members, or affiliates 17 are also restricted and cannot come up out of that. 18 F is not subordinate to Echo. It is a whole new 19 paragraph, and it addresses all those who don't have 20 e-mail addresses that are purpleheart.org. 21 MS. FIGUEROA: Adjutant? 22 MR. ADKINS: Chuck Adkins, National Adjutant 23 from before. Back in the 2016, '17 rewrite, it was 24 placed into the NEC that you could not spam members 25 of the NEC. And the e-mails that we're talking

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about, and there were a lot of them, that were harmful, hurtful, hateful, disparaging, and just downright despicable.

4 Why was it only limited to the members of the 5 NEC? Why didn't that apply to all -- I asked the 6 question, but at that time, the e-mails were 7 actually directed to members of the NEC. But 8 lately, and as of last week, and yes, some people 9 are maybe just expressing their opinions, but there 10 were some disparaging remarks made back and forth 11 among some individuals. That's what this is trying 12 to control.

And yes, it can be controlled. And yes, it can be enforced. Yes, people are expressing their First Amendment rights. But courts have ruled on language that could be deemed hurtful, harmful, disparaging, and et cetera. I think we need this in our Code of Conduct.

MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Siebels.

20 MR. SIEBELS: PNC Siebels. I'm totally opposed 21 to this because one key factor has not come out yet. 22 In this amendment, they talked about some of the 23 warehouses. One of those warehouses talks about the 24 Information Technology Act, Section 66. That 25 particular legislation didn't come from the United

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1	States folks. That came from the nation of India, is
2	where that came from. Shouldn't be in here. This
3	is a bad proposal. I'm going against it.
4	MR. FERGUSON: National Commander from the
5	floor. I understand how this is written it may not
6	make sense. But one of the problems we're having is
7	let me ask this question for everybody. Once you
8	do an e- mail that is permanent, it is on record.
9	So we at the national headquarters at
10	purpleheart.org have to save every e-mail that comes
11	across that's on there.
12	So that's why the National Commander at
13	purpleheart.org, National Adjutant, when we pass
14	that on, those e-mails were in there. So that's in
15	the transactions of what we have, have the
16	disparaging, degrading e-mails and things back and
17	forth at the purpleheart.org. We do not need to
18	have that. So what if that e-mail somehow
19	inadvertently got out and maybe came to one of the
20	donors that wants to do this. And they say, oh,
21	wow, you can't even control your inside stuff.
22	You're sending this out.
23	This sets a precedent for us. We're supposed
24	to be professionals that's here. That's what we're
25	looking at to make sure that we get this thing taken

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1	care of. You personally can do whatever you want on
2	your e-mails. That's what I'm not asking that's on
3	this. I'm asking that we protect what we do as the
4	Order. If you were at a business that has anything
5	else on that, and you were corresponding like that,
6	do you think they would let you stay in that
7	business anymore? Thank you.
8	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Smrt.
9	MR. SMRT: Permission to address the assembly a
10	second time.
11	MS. FIGUEROA: All in favor to allow Patriot
12	Smrt to speak a second time?
13	AUDIENCE: Aye.
14	MR. WETZEL: Any opposed?
15	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Aye.
16	MR. SMRT: Wow. I love you guys. Smrt,
17	Kentucky. Refocusing. With this, we want to
18	ensure, obviously, civility and things of that
19	nature. The conclusion and the direction, laudatory
20	as it may be, does not meet its mark. No one who
21	takes a position, elected or appointed, should be
22	shielded just because they have a purple.org
23	official e-mail. Sometimes they use that.
24	Sometimes they have backup e-mails. That's fine,
25	too. And I strongly encourage the use of BCC. When



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1	you guys want to post, you know, your opinions,
2	identify the individual that you want to address.
3	But don't include 375 other additional addresses out
4	in the open on the to block. That's a pet peeve of
5	mine.
6	But with this, please look at the fact that you
7	have the right, obviously, to petition your
8	leadership. Purpleheart.org address does not shield
9	them from criticism, critique, or your opinions.
10	And I encourage you strongly to understand that that
11	is your privilege, that is your right, and that's
12	how we reprove one another and make this
13	organization better. And that is why I'm
14	encouraging you guys to, obviously, disapprove this.
15	MS. FIGUEROA: Commander Anderson.
16	MR. T. ANDERSON: Region 2, Terry Anderson. I'm
17	a constitutionalist. I fought for my country for
18	the freedom of speech, freedom of rights to be able
19	to make my own decisions and live with them. I have
20	been in positions where I've been attacked and
21	called everything except a white man, which I am.
22	Bottom line is, they had the right to speak
23	their mind. I might not have liked what they said,
24	but they had the right. I have the right. And I
25	feel this is this just goes against the
l	

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1	Constitution, period, and I think we should reject
2	it.
3	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Middleton.
4	MR. MIDDLETON: Middleton, Delegate of Georgia.
5	On Page 61 of 94 pages in our current bylaws, it
6	talks about the grievance process. It says, "A
7	grievance is a complaint from a member for some
8	action which causes disruption within the Order."
9	Obviously, spamming people, whatever it is, would be
10	considered disruption within the Order. I think we
11	already have the ability to sanction, or whatever it
12	is, anybody that's considered to be spamming,
13	whether it be from the top down or from the bottom
14	up. So I urge we disapprove this resolution.
15	MS. FIGUEROA: Call for a vote.
16	MR. SMRT: Call to question. Smrt, Kentucky.
17	MS. FIGUEROA: Okay. The motion on the floor
18	is to approve this resolution. So the motion all
19	in favor to approve this resolution, please stand or
20	raise your hand.
21	MR. FERGUSON: I'm here to agree to disagree.
22	MS. FIGUEROA: Okay. All in favor to
23	disapprove, stand or raise your hand. Any abstains?
24	MR. KROPTAVICH: NJA, abstain.
25	MR. OLIVAREZ: Hold your hands up if you're

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1	abstaining.
2	MR. FERGUSON: Give them the numbers.
3	MR. OLIVAREZ: Nine. Nine. Nine approved, 57
4	disapproved, and 11 abstentions. The motion
5	MS. FIGUEROA: The motion fails.
6	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate of
7	Georgia. I move that we disapprove Resolution
8	number 2024-04-NFF.
9	MR. FERGUSON: It just failed.
10	MR. OLIVAREZ: It just failed.
11	MR. SMRT: Doug.
12	MR. MIDDLETON: Yeah.
13	MR. SMRT: We're talking about 24-04.
14	MR. MIDDLETON: It failed to be approved. It
15	has
16	MR. SMRT: Oh.
17	MR. MIDDLETON: It has not
18	MR. FERGUSON: It has to be failed to be.
19	MR. MIDDLETON: It has not
20	MR. SMRT: Second to formally disapprove. Smrt,
21	Kentucky
22	MR. FERGUSON: All right.
23	MS. FIGUEROA: Discussion? Call to question?
24	Motion is to disapprove 2024-04-NFF. All in favor
25	to disapprove this resolution? Any opposed to

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1	disapprove? Any abstain?
2	MR. KROPTAVICH: NJA, again.
3	MR. WITT: Nine abstain.
4	MR. OLIVAREZ: So the counts are 56 to approve
5	the disapproval, zero to oppose, and nine
6	abstentions. Motion fails.

11	MR. FERGUSON: Okay. Everybody enjoy your
12	lunch? All right. Good break? I guess so. Make
13	sure I get everybody in there, sorry. Right now,
14	before we move on, I'm going to have a guest come up
15	from AIL, Cece, to come talk to us real quick. If
16	you want, come on up.
17	MS. ODELL: Good morning. How are you? Good
18	morning or we or afternoon. American Income
19	Life has partnered with the Military Order since
20	April of 2022. American Income provides every
21	member of the Military Order with an accidental
22	death and dismemberment benefit. This benefit
23	started at \$2,000 per member and was increased to
24	\$2500 per member of last year.
25	Since April of 2022, we have paid 12 claims for



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1 a total of \$24,000. This total consists of 11 2 accidental death claims and one dismemberment claim. 3 I'm sure we have missed claims due to members not 4 realizing that they have this benefit. We can 5 always back up and pay those claims. If a member 6 would reach out to us at any time, we can back up to 7 April of 2022.

At last year's convention, it was voted to 8 9 allow American Income to assist in running our 10 membership list through the National Change of 11 Address database. This flagged 4,167 bad addresses 12 and 4,232 changed addresses. Now, we know this in turn caused a lot of additional work for the ladies 13 14 at headquarters and for your state offices. But we 15 also hope that it helped clean up your membership 16 records.

17 With this partnership, we prepare and do a 18 notification mailing to your members every 15 to 18 19 months to let your members know that this benefit is 20 in place, the amount of the benefit, the other no-21 cost benefits that we offer. And your members have 22 the ability to name a beneficiary if they would 23 like. But they're not required to name that 24 beneficiary to have the benefit. So every single 25 member of the Military Order has the accidental



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death benefit, regardless of whether or not they've
ever completed that beneficiary card.
In October of 2023, we did send out 43,807
members notifications. 7,456 members responded,
which is about 17 percent. That's higher than our
normal response. And of that, we had 868 of your
members ask for additional, supplemental coverage,
whether it be a burial policy, a mortgage coverage-
type policy. So for that, it kind of shows us that
there's, you know, a need for additional life
insurance, and we're glad that we're able to offer
that.
My husband is actually a disabled veteran.
Unfortunately, he is uninsurable through our
company. So we know that there is a chance that
there are veterans that reach out to us for coverage
and are uninsurable. And, unfortunately, that does
happen in the underwriting process. But luckily,
like I said, we have been able to cover 868 members.
American Income appreciates the time, the
additional work of the members of leadership and the
staff, that you guys have put in to help and make
the partnership successful. I had the pleasure of
meeting with Commander Ferguson and others in March
at headquarters to present this year's donation,

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1	which was \$3,450. And I hope the upcoming
2	leadership and this Body will vote to continue the
3	partnership into next year. And then I will go see
4	you guys in Reno, hopefully.
5	If there are ever any questions, my name and my
6	number are always printed at the bottom of the
7	letter, and that letter is available on your
8	website. So there's always if there's ever a
9	question, anybody can always reach out to me.
10	Chuck, the girls at headquarters, everyone has my
11	number. So please, any other questions, please
12	reach out, okay?
13	And God bless you guys. And hope you guys have
14	a great convention. Unfortunately, I will not be
15	able to stay. I have left some MedVacs kits out at
16	the booth here, where they're selling T-shirts. But
17	I will be moving out shortly. So thank you. Thank
18	you, Order.
19	MR. FERGUSON: We appreciate it.
20	MS. ODELL: Thank you so much.
21	MR. ADKINS: Good to see you, ma'am.
22	MS. ODELL: Good to see you. Thank you, guys.
23	Thank you so much. Thanks for having me talk today.
24	MR. FERGUSON: We're waiting on the Bylaws
25	Committee chairman for a minute. He had to take

It can 19 be something as simple as a hinge. One gentleman --20 and I said, or some 14/2 wire that you want to buy. 21 He said, oh man, I just paid \$98. Where's that gentleman? Where's he at? Is he in here? He said, 22 23 I just paid \$98 for a roll of wire. I said, you 24 could have probably saved at least 30 percent on 25 that.



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1	You'll save anywhere from 20 to 60 to 70
2	percent on materials or products that you use every
3	day for maintenance, for repairs, for renovating.
4	If you went into Home Depot and you wanted a
5	countertop for your wife, because she wants a new
6	kitchen, even the cabinets, you'll get major
7	discounts on. That countertop is \$160 in Home
8	Depot, to be purchased and installed. That same
9	countertop through this work through this program
10	for you all, is \$65. You go into Sherwin-Williams,
11	you want to buy the tile. I was just talking to
12	somebody, oh, my wife only wants to buy Behr paint
13	in Home Depot. I said, why not go into Sherwin-
14	Williams and buy their \$150 a gallon, and walk out
15	with it for \$60? So it touches everything, from
16	carpet, to hinges, to wire, to faucets, to lights,
17	fans.
18	Somebody just somebody just said, oh man, we
19	just bought fans for our entire house. I said,
20	well, you could have saved probably 20 to 30
21	percent. If that's not of interest to you, the MOPH
22	has other programs that you can also fund. But this
23	is 100 percent deductible. Did I say that right?
24	MS. FIGUEROA: You did.
25	PEN: And Tracey has been kind enough to work

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1	with me, along with Carder, to get this program out
2	there. And I think there's some misunderstanding
3	about what it can do for you all. Please use this
4	for your benefit. It does not benefit me or the
5	American Dream programs. Just look at that, go to
6	americandreamprograms.com. You'll see all the
7	vendors.

8 But more importantly, go to the mophfund.org, 9 and it's in there. There's a way to purchase it. You register. Our support staff will send you a 10 11 welcome packet and say thank you. And we will 12 support you through anything you need. I just was 13 talking to another one of the Purple Heart recipients who said, we want to buy a generator. 14 Do you have generators? I said, yes, that's the 15 16 toolbox. Go out and find a generator that you like, 17 and I'll see if it's on there.

I think Carder told me at one point, yes, I
need a five-ton air conditioner. But you look at
the cost for five-ton air conditioners, and you look
at what you can get through this program, and you
might pay closer attention to it.

I just want to say thank you from my heart, for everything that you've done. I thank my father, who was in World War II. I thank my brother, who was in



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1	during Vietnam. And I thank each and every one of
2	you. If I could have you if you could feel this,
3	you would feel my passion and my appreciation for
4	you. Thank you so much. God bless you.
5	MR. FERGUSON: So I asked her, during the
6	congratulations behind me, one of the things about
7	the MOPH Fund when you go online we had talked
8	about this last year. So the \$100 that goes in
9	there, she's waiving the if you signed it up here
10	at that, waiving the \$25. So then the other \$75 is
11	split up.
12	\$50 actually goes to the Fund, which that helps
13	the programs and support the order that's there.
14	Then the other \$25, if you registered as your
15	chapter, your chapter can get that \$25, or your
16	department, so more people can get registered. So
17	that's money that you can go to a
18	chapter/department. Everybody got that one?
19	AUDIENCE: Yeah.

14	Ed Abbey, Parliamentarian. While it does not
15	stipulate yes or no, unfortunately by the practice
16	being permitted at the last convention, we set a
17	precedent. It was not approved, but it was not
18	disapproved. It was not called to question, you
19	know you know, to the best of my recollection. I
20	yield the floor to the patriot from Kentucky.
21	MR. SMRT: In rebuttal to the previous comment,
22	I did raise this at the last convention, which is
23	why then
24	MR. ADKINS: Point of order. We need to you
25	need to seek approval to speak for a second time.

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1	MR. ABBEY: Negative. Parliamentary procedure
2	is, if a person is speaking to rebuttal, they may
3	speak for one minute.
4	MR. ADKINS: I stand corrected.
5	MR. ABBEY: You sit corrected. Now you sit
6	corrected a second time.
7	MR. SMRT: For multiple applications in
8	previous conventions, I did point out at one time,
9	bylaws were forwarded to allow digital voting. They
10	never made it through. That change never happened.
11	And we disregarded and told the people that were
12	online at previous conventions that they had voice
13	but no vote.
14	MR. ABBEY: But they did vote.
15	MR. SMRT: No sir, they did not.
16	MR. ABBEY: I also have the dubious honor of
17	running the digital, and I did transmit votes. They
18	were recorded into the records. You know, we can go
19	offline later for the brevity for the Body. You
20	know, if you would like to research, we can go back
21	online.
22	But, you know, I would like to state that my
23	recollection is what the basis for my ruling would
24	be, and it is that the body at the time accepted it
25	and therefore set a precedent. That could be ruled
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on by the Judge Advocate, but once you do something, you can't take it back.

3 Well, that's what I'm saying, but I don't have 4 access to it. The question was, can we check last 5 year's minutes? And that's what I'm saying exactly 6 needs to happen and then get a ruling and 7 determination. But for those of you that were there, 8 you would see that I was sitting over there, and I 9 would raise my hand and state that a, you know, 10 participant was voting, and it was recorded into the 11 record. Commander, I yield to floor to the chair.

12 MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. So let me ask this 13 couple question that's here. So why did we do an 14 online registration for them to come in? So that's 15 one of the things that was done so we can have 16 people who not make it by physical means, or it 17 could be financial means that's here. So that way 18 they can have in this. So one of the key things is, 19 like the Parliamentarian said, we have done this. 20 So actually we started out in South Dakota, then it 21 went to Baton Rouge, and now it's coming towards 22 here. Oh, and West -- I guess he's reminded me of 23 West Virginia, too. 24 So voluntary -- so I guess you said it's been

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set to precedents. So I'm wondering what few people

that we would have to vote, they need to have their vote. And I would think that would be -- we would do them injustice if they could not vote. Go ahead, Parliamentarian. Then I'll get to you, Smrt.

5 MR. ABBEY: Ed Abbey, Parliamentarian. The 6 online registration does not distinguish between 7 voice only or voice and a vote. The same price, but 8 otherwise, we are disenfranchising people that for 9 whatever reason may not be in physical attendance at 10 the convention. And I think that's something that 11 we, as patriots that understand sacrifice, should be 12 willing to acknowledge and accept a modification of 13 behaviors.

14 But to supplement what, you know, Patriot Smrt 15 is saying, we need to codify this so that it is not 16 challengeable. It needs to be something. And, you 17 know, I -- the last thing I want to see is one more 18 amendment, but I think we should have an 19 administrative SOP that we can go ahead and do most 20 of this paper drill with, instead of beating 21 ourselves up for a day and a half on amendments to 22 bylaws. 23 MR. FERGUSON: Correct. Thank you. Thank you, 24 Patriot Abbey. Yes. 25 MR. KROPTAVICH: I just want to make point for

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1	order here. And I was going to write a nice long
2	note, or if I was in person, while I wish I could.
3	But due to family situation this year, I'm very tied
4	up with a brand new infant, just for everyone to
5	know.
6	And what I would bring up is, we need to think
7	about sustainability. We no longer have funding to
8	keep having people travel to these things. We don't
9	have the funding for the structure or environment.
10	We don't have the membership anymore. We need to
11	start looking at it long term, a better mechanism
12	for certain types of participation beyond one
13	national Body and one National Convention that
14	requires us to be physically present. That's what we
15	have now. But I do think we need to start thinking
16	about that alternative format.
17	MR. FERGUSON: That was for the Judge Advocate.
18	PNC Rivera.
19	MR. RIVERA: Yeah. PNC Rivera, checking in.
20	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton, National

14	responsible for the recording and transcription of
15	the minutes of the National Finance Committee
16	meeting and distributing to the members of the NEC.
17	Five, the National Adjutant shall not be signatory
18	on any of the Order's banking or other financial
19	accounts, but the permission of the National
20	Commander may have viewing only authority. See
21	Article 11, Section 5." And be it further resolved
22	that Article 12, National Committees, Section 5,
23	Paragraph A, Investment Committee be amended to read
24	as follows: "Includes the Chair of the National
25	Finance Committee, the National Finance Officer, and

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1	the voting members of the National Finance
2	Committee." And be it further resolved that Article
3	12, National Committees, Section 5, Investment
4	Committee, to be amended to read by adding: "D, the
5	National Adjutant shall not be a member of the
6	Investments Committee, but shall, one, attend
7	meetings to provide information and ask questions,
8	and two, be the ex officio secretary responsible for
9	the recording and transcription of the minutes of
10	the Investment Committee meeting and distributing to
11	the members of the NEC. E, the National Adjutant
12	shall not be signatory on any of the Order's
13	investment accounts, but, with the permission of the
14	National Commander, may have viewing only authority.
15	See Article 11, Section 5." And be it further
16	resolved that Article 11, Duties of the National
17	Officers, Section 5, National Adjutant, be amended
18	by adding: "T, the National Adjutant shall not be a
19	signatory on any of the Order's bank, investment or
20	other financial accounts. The National Adjutant,
21	with the approval of the National Commander, may
22	have viewing only authority in order to help the
23	National Commander, National Finance Committee, and
24	National Finance Officer make informed decisions
25	regarding the budget and investments." And be it



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1	further resolve that Article 11, Duties of the
2	National Officers, Section 5, National Adjutant,
3	Paragraph H3, be amended to read: "When amendments
4	to the Constitution bylaws and/or rituals are made
5	by National Conventions, the National Adjutant shall
6	be responsible for ensuring all changes are
7	incorporated into these documents. A copy of these
8	documents shall be used for this purpose, to ensure
9	the integrity of the current master while the
10	changes are made. The National Adjutant may seek
11	assistance from the trusted key employee, or member
12	of the Bylaws Committee, to type the changes." And
13	be it further resolved that Article 11, Duties of
14	the National Officers, Section 5, National Adjutant,
15	Paragraph H5-A, be amended to read: "When the
16	National Adjutant has need of updating the bylaws, a
17	duplicate will be made to allow a trusted key
18	employee or member of the Bylaws Committee to type
19	the changes." Patriot Middleton?
20	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate,
21	Georgia. I move that we vote to approve resolution
22	Number 2024-05-NFF.
23	MS. FIGUEROA: Second?
24	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Department of Kentucky, and
25	from Kentucky, Chapter Representative. Seconded.
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1	MS. FIGUEROA: Discussion?
2	MR. RIVERA: Yeah. PNC Rivera. And this is a
3	very critical bylaw. When I became a National
4	Adjutant, and I went up there in 2019. The Adjutant
5	was signed on to the accounts. Multiple other
6	people were signed onto the bank account. So there
7	was money missing. There was another time we went
8	up there, the same thing had happened there.
9	The bylaws are very clear that the National
10	Finance Officer, the National Commander are
11	signatories on the account. The National Finance
12	Committee Chair is signature on the investment
13	account, along with the Finance Officer and the
14	National Commander. It's critical that that's the
15	it has to be that way.
16	In the past, it would say well, it doesn't say
17	that the National Adjutant can't be a signatory on
18	it. So that's why this bylaw is critical, so that
19	anybody that gets up there can't just go in and
20	change the bank accounts, set up bank accounts, and
21	and become a signature on it because we've had
22	people that have taken quite a bit of money and
23	spent money unauthorized by doing that.
24	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Smrt?
25	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky. I could assume, but

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1	I don't need any assistance to be an ass. I just
2	want to be egalitarian in my query. Did the
З	Adjutant coordinate with himself to ensure that
4	these duties are within his scope and that he was
5	consulted in order to make these changes? Thank
6	you.
7	MR. ADKINS: Okay. Patriot Adkins, National
8	Adjutant. It wasn't done by one single person
9	from the floor, I said that. I actually coordinated
10	with the National Finance Officer on this because
11	when he and I served together before, as you heard
12	him state, we had found that the adjutant had taken
13	it upon himself to go get him signed on to our bank
14	accounts.
15	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I don't think he did the
16	investment accounts.
17	MR. ADKINS: But we know he did the bank
18	accounts. And then, when I came back this year, and
19	Ernie came back as Finance Officer, we found out it
20	happened again with my predecessor. The Adjutant
21	should not have any signatory, you know,
22	responsibilities. Viewing, yes. But even under, you
23	know, controlled measures from, you know, the
24	National Commander, which is what this is going to
25	do.

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1	The National Adjutant needs to see, so he can
2	make informed decisions for the budget regarding the
3	headquarters, okay? But should not have any
4	signatory authority. Thank you.
5	MR. MIDDLETON: Thank you, Patriot.
6	MR. WALLOT: The only time the National
7	Adjutant has to sign any financial or bank papers,
8	he has to authorize that the signatures on the
9	account were duly elected by the corporation. And
10	that's the only time one place is Daniel Ramirez
11	(phonetic). Dennis Wallot, Chairman, Finance
12	Committee.
13	MS. FIGUEROA: Call for question? The motion
14	on the floor is to approve resolution 2024-05-NFF,
15	Duties of the National Adjutant. All in favor of
16	the approval of this resolution, either raise your
17	hand or stand.
18	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton, most agree.
19	MS. FIGUEROA: Any opposed? Any abstentions?
20	MR. WITT: 84, zero, and two.
21	MR. HANNERMAN: I vigorously abstained.
22	MS. FIGUEROA: The motion passes as 84
23	approved, zero opposed, two abstentions.
24	MR. OLIVAREZ: Robert Olivarez, Bylaws
25	Chairman. I am going to withdraw 2024-06.

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1	MS. FIGUEROA: Resolution number 2024-06-NFF
2	has been withdrawn by the Bylaw Chairman. All
3	right. This is resolution number 2024-07-NFF
4	regarding duties of the National Judge Advocate.
5	Resolved that Article 11, Duties of National
6	Officers, Section 8, National Judge Advocate be
7	amended to read by adding, "G, in the event that the
8	position of the National Judge Advocate becomes
9	permanently vacant for any reason, the National
10	Commander shall perform the following action: "One,
11	appoint a past National Judge Advocate or a
12	Department Judge Advocate to fulfill the duties of
13	the National Judge Advocate until such time the
14	position is permanently filled by election of a new
15	National Judge Advocate. The individual shall meet
16	the same requirements specified in Paragraph A
17	above." "Two, should a past National Judge Advocate
18	or Department Judge Advocate not be available, the
19	National Commander, with the approval of the NEC,
20	may obtain outside legal counsel to handle legal
21	matters or disciplinary hearings until such time the
22	position is filled." "H, in the event that the
23	position of the National Judge Advocate is
24	temporarily unavailable for any reason to include
25	military, personnel, and employment or must recuse

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1	themselves from a particular matter due to the
2	conflict of interest, the National Commander shall
3	perform the following actions." "One, shall appoint
4	a past National Judge Advocate or a Department Judge
5	Advocate to fulfill the duties of the NJA until the
6	earliest time of the conflict of interest is
7	resolved, the period of the unavailability is
8	resolved, or the matter is closed. The individual
9	shall meet the same requirements specified in
10	Paragraph A above." "Two, should a past National
11	Judge Advocate or Department Judge Advocate not be
12	available, the National Commander, with the approval
13	of the NEC, may obtain outside legal counsel to
14	handle legal matters or disciplinary hearings until
15	the conflict of interest is resolved, the period of
16	unavailability is resolved, or the matter is
17	closed." "Three, the position of the NJA shall be
18	deemed vacant if the period of unavailability is not
19	resolved within 90 consecutive days of the first
20	notice of unavailability due to military, personnel,
21	or employment reasons. This provision does not
22	apply to conflict of interest on individual
23	matters." Patriot Middleton.
24	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate
25	Georgia. I move that we approve resolution number

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1	2024-07-NFF.
2	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion to approve the
3	resolution. Is there a second?
4	MR. ADKINS: Patriot Chuck Adkins, National
5	Adjutant from the floor. I second.
6	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion approved and second.
7	Discussion?
8	MR. ADKINS: As you heard the Secretary of the
9	Bylaws Committee read, you know, there is a need
10	when our Judge Advocate like, say, for instance,
11	Walter all of a sudden becomes unavailable. We've
12	had this in the past where we've had Judge Advocates
13	have to recuse themselves or withdraw from, like, a
14	disciplinary hearing because of their relationships
15	with an individual who is being charged.
16	What happens when that position becomes vacant?
17	Okay. The Judge Advocate is not there. The Judge
18	Advocate said, well, I sent the charges over to the
19	National Senior Vice for him to look at and approve,
20	you know, whether or not this should go forward.
21	Nowhere in the bylaws does it state that you
22	could do that. So there is a need to find a way
23	that when the Judge Advocate is not available, you
24	know, we have the tools that, you know, available
25	for the Commander to fill that position to get key
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1	input on any type of legal or disciplinary that we
2	have within the order. Thank you.
3	MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Siebels.
4	MR. SIEBELS: PNC Siebels. I'm generally a
5	favor of this, but I would like to hear from the
6	National Commander or Finance Officer, if we hire
7	outside an attorney, how is this going to fit in the
8	budget? Are we prepared for that?
9	MR. FERGUSON: PNC Siebels, this is National
10	Commander Ferguson. I had to think there for a
11	minute so to make sure I was on the right tire.
12	That's what we got in our contingency fees as legal
13	fees. So we do have that's down there at, I
14	think I remember, at \$5,000. So we do have that
15	just in case that did happen. And we actually had
16	that for last year, too.
17	MR. SIEBELS: Thank you, Commander.
18	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot McIntosh.
19	MR. MCINTOSH: National Historian McIntosh. I
20	agree with an awful lot of this thing. There is
21	just one problem that I foresee. The very first
22	sentence in the bylaw of the duties of the Judge
23	Advocate is, "The National Judge Advocate shall be
24	an active, licensed attorney in good standing with
25	the higher Bar association or licensed to practice

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2 The problem is, if you appoint somebody pro tem 3 from a department that is not a lawyer, you're not 4 filling the position with the lawyer. Now we have 5 someplace like Maryland, they have a number of 6 lawyers in their chapter and department. But you 7 have to go someplace else, you can't put in just 8 anybody there. So the fact that it didn't restrict 9 it. 10 If they -- check with the wording that the 11 department, Judge Advocate, that met their

12 requirements of being a lawyer, that's fine. But 13 without that, this is bag of problems because you 14 had to put in a bylaw where potentially you could 15 put somebody in that does not meet the

16 qualifications. 17 MS. FIGUEROA: Francis Figueroa, Bylaw 18 Secretary. In number one, that last sentence, it 19 does say the individual shall meet the same 20 requirements specified in Paragraph A above, which I 21 believe is the paragraph that you read from. 22 MR. MCINTOSH: I stand corrected. 23 MR. EGGELSTON: What? What? 24 MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Eggelston.

MR. EGGELSTON: On the record. Hey, you took

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1 my breath over that one. Charles Eggelston, Service 2 Director. I never heard you say that, Nick. So I'm 3 about to fall on it.

4 I just want to make sure that the section where 5 it was talking about disciplinary actions, are these 6 being advised from an outside lawyer? It cannot be 7 from an outside lawyer. Has to come from internal. 8 So is that just, you know, advice when it comes to 9 the disciplinary actions, or is that from the here 10 of that lawyer? He cannot give a punishment. He 11 can only advise. He's going to have to look at the 12 particulars with that because he may not even be 13 able to that.

MS. FIGUEROA: Yes. Any outside legal counselwill only be able to advise. Patriot Taylor.

MR. TAYLOR: Fred Taylor, Past National Commander. This particular issue has been a thorn on our side for a while. The Judge Advocate should be sitting right there in this convention. You're not going to get many attorneys who earn 3 to \$500 an hour to sit here for nothing. This needs to be addressed.

A couple of years ago I was called. I'm a
 Florida Supreme Court qualified arbitrator. I'm a
 Florida certificated mediator in criminal law and



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1	Florida certificated mediator in family law. They
2	called and asked if I would do it. And I said, yes,
3	but do I have to be a lawyer? They looked into it
4	and said, you know what? We can't accept you
5	because you're not an attorney.

6 I'm qualified, but I'm not an attorney. This 7 is a problem. If that Judge Advocate isn't sitting 8 right there, but we have these kinds of discussions 9 to render an opinion, and that's all they do, the 10 Commander makes a decision, then we're shooting in 11 the dark with 100 different interpretations. Not a 12 legal interpretation, a personal interpretation.

I think next year we need to address this. And if a person comes that is imminently qualified with a legal background, that may not be a lawyer, I think we need to take a look at this because, like I said, that person should be sitting right there -the Judge Advocate, right there, to answer these things instantly. Thank you.

MS. FIGUEROA: Point taken. Thank you. Call for question. The motion on the floor is to approve resolution 2024-07-NFF regarding duties of the National Judge Advocate. Anyone who approves, please stand or raise your hand. Any opposed? MR. ADKINS: Hold your hand up.

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1	MS. FIGUEROA: Any abstentions?
2	MR. WITT: 79, two, and five.
3	MS. FIGUEROA: The resolution passes with 79
4	approved, two opposed, and five abstentions.
5	Resolution number 2024-08-NFF resignation from and
6	reinstatement into the Military Order of the Purple
7	Heart. Resolved that Article 2, Membership, Section
8	6, Resignation be amended to read, "Section 6
9	Resignation and Reinstatement. A, Resignation.
10	One, to protect the rights of the members, Patriots
11	no longer desiring to be considered a member of the
12	Military Order of the Purple Heart must submit a
13	statement of resignation of member membership."
14	"Two, a signed statement making mails or attached to
15	an e-mail to the national headquarters. If sent by
16	mail, the membership card should accompany the
17	statement of resignation. Three, the effective date
18	of the resignation is the postmark date on the
19	envelope of the resignation letter. If e-mailed and
20	no signed statement is attached, the effective
21	resignation date is the date the e-mail was sent.
22	The National Adjutant shall date stamp the receipt
23	of resignation notification and give to membership
24	office for processing." "Three, a member may resign
25	from the order at a convention by submitting a

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1	written notice to the Commander presiding at the
2	convention. The membership card should accompany
3	the written notice. The date and time of receipt by
4	the presiding Commander is the effective date of the
5	resignation. The resignation shall be turned over
6	to the National Adjutant and membership office for
7	processing." "Four, a resignation to escape charges
8	may not be accepted. The charges may be preferred,
9	and the disciplinary hearing should proceed the same
10	as if the resignation had not been sent in. A
11	request for resignation to escape charges may be
12	submitted to and accepted or rejected by a Commander
13	at any level within the member's direct chain of
14	command. The individual shall be notified in
15	writing via any shipping service entity, certified
16	mail returned receipt requested, whether or not the
17	request for resignation to escape charges is
18	accepted. Article 15, Section C1D, a copy of the
19	request for resignation and notice of acceptance or
20	rejection shall be sent to the National Adjutant."
21	"Five, a member who resigns or whose resignation in
22	lieu of charges is accepted shall no longer have
23	rights, privileges, or consequences of membership in
24	the Military Order of Purple Heart." "B,
25	Reinstatement. One, to regain membership, the

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1	patriot must reapply and provide documentation of
2	the award of a Purple Heart and pay the current
3	dues. Two, the determination to be re-accepted into
4	a Chapter is made by the assigned Chapter, Article
5	2, Section 2C. Three, before an individual who
6	resigned to avoid charges under Article 15, Section
7	13 can be reinstated, a National Judge Advocate
8	review shall be conducted in accordance with Article
9	15, Section 13 A2D." "Four, the Jurisdictional
10	Commander at the level which the adjudication was
11	halted with advice from the National Judge Advocate,
12	may reject an individual's application for
13	reinstatement in the order for poor moral character
14	if information regarding this individual's
15	resignation after charges were filed was considered.
16	Article 15, Section 13, Paragraph A2, if the
17	Jurisdictional Commander declines to reject the
18	applicant, the National Adjutants shall deliver the
19	information to the gaining Chapter for its
20	consideration. The Chapter may accept or reject the
21	applicant in accordance with Article 2, Section 2B
22	and C." "Be it further resolved that Article 15,
23	Section A2 be amended by adding, "Section A,
24	Charges. Three, no charges may be adjudicated
25	against a member or associate member who has



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1	submitted a resignation from the order and said
2	resignation has been accepted. However, a request
3	for resignation to escape charges need not be
4	accepted. The charges may be preferred and the
5	disciplinary hearing should proceed the same as if
6	the resignation had not been sent in, Article 2,
7	Section A4." "A request for resignation to escape
8	charges may be submitted to and accepted or rejected
9	by a Commander at any level within the member's
10	direct chain of command. The individual shall be
11	notified in writing via any shipping service entity,
12	certified mail, return receipt requested, whether or
13	not the request for resignation to escape charges is
14	accepted. Article 15, Section C1D, a copy of the
15	request for resignation and notice of acceptance or
16	rejection shall be sent to the National Adjutant."
17	"3A, if accepted the effective date of a request for
18	resignation is the date on the postmark of the
19	envelope of the resignation letter or other written
20	correspondence. The National Adjutant shall date
21	stamp the receipt of the resignation notification
22	and give to the membership office for processing.
23	Article 2, Section 6A3." "3B, the effective date on
24	an accepted request for resignation sent by e-mail
25	is the date it was sent. A printout copy will be

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1	made as evidence of the resignation date and shall
2	be retained as part of charges evidence package and
3	a second copy will be given to the membership office
4	for processing. Article 2, Section 6A3." "3C, the
5	charges, evidence, statements, testimony, and all
6	other documents will be put in a sealed file and be
7	retained by the National Adjutant. Three, the former
8	member reapplies for membership, the charges will be
9	reviewed by the National Judge Advocate, also see
10	Article 2, Section 6B3, who will then, one, confer
11	with the Commander now at the level in the chain of
12	command where the adjudication was called in because
13	of the resignation." "Two, make a recommendation to
14	the Jurisdictional Commander as to whether the
15	adjudication should proceed from the point where the
16	procedure stopped. Three, the Jurisdictional
17	Commander will make the decision about proceeding
18	with or dropping the charges. Also see Article 2,
19	Section 6B4." Patriot Middleton.
20	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate,
21	Department of Georgia. I move that we pass
22	resolution number 2024-08-NFF.
23	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion approved. Second?
24	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky for discussions.
25	Second.

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MS. FIGUEROA: Discussions. Patriot Smrt. MR. SMRT: I appreciate obviously the author and/or authors helping us out by putting in bold the actual changes because you'll see that there's some significant adjustments and -- and modifications that they think are likely as well as necessary. Most of the stuff is not in bold because there's already precedents, bylaws, and things of that

9 nature.

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10 I do want to point out -- and the only point of 11 order that I would like to look at is, if I'm not 12 mistaken, this is a voluntary service organization. 13 My statement would be, if I got a case of the mm 14 today and submitted my letter of resignation, most 15 of you would celebrate it. But if I resign, I 16 There's no way you could compel me to resign. 17 remain.

18 If I do not remain, you cannot charge me. You 19 cannot waste money trying to, you know, bring me to 20 a disciplinary panel or a grievance panel. And that 21 is the only concern that I have because some of the 22 other stuff is legitimate and explanatory as well as 23 perfunctory in order to be able to clearly identify 24 the process. But the point is, you can't make me. 25 And if I have resigned, then I cannot defend



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myself if you still bring up charges. And I do
resolve that this has happened before. Changes have
been made to Article 15 because of that because
almost ten years ago, an individual that was brought
under charges as well as chapters and other things
that caused a major disruption to this association
and order, was brought by a gentleman that was
stolen valor and was proved that was stolen valor.
We lost a good chapter. We lost units. And
the individual sent his letter to the National
headquarters and resigned. And yet we still
impaneled charges, you know, for money and
everything else. And they prosecuted this
individual in absentia when he had resigned on
Friday. But the Adjutant did not let the impaneled
committee know that the gentleman had already been,
you know, received.
So I do not like the idea that "an individual's
letter of resignation must be accepted." It is
acknowledged. The person is gone. It has been
adjudicated and requested as well as modified so
that those charges, grievances, whatever they, may
or may not have "avoided" stays in, you know,
abeyance in suspension, in cryogenetic, you know,
chamber waiting if and only if that individual tries

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1	to return. And if that does, there's already
2	procedures that said the charges can be reinstated
3	as of that date. I do not like the fact that
4	someone can tell me, I can't resign.
5	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Middleton.
6	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate
7	Georgia. Despite not having the dulcet tones of my
8	compatriot back there, we had an issue similar where
9	we had a patriot in a significant position that was
10	brought up on charges, and he resigned in lieu of
11	facing the charges. And then later, another
12	individual as Patriot Wallot would call, the WCE,
13	reinstated that particular patriot to full
14	privileges as such and totally disregarding the fact
15	that he had been under charges. But the charges were
16	never preferred because we couldn't do it at that
17	time.
18	So I disagree with Patriot Smrt on this one.
19	And I think that this makes sense that we get it
20	into the record that the person was in fact on
21	charges, that we go ahead and adjudicate those
22	charges be they, you know, fulfilled as being
23	correct or they're thrown out whatever. But we had
24	an issue that totally became unresolved because we
25	didn't clarify in our bylaws exactly how we should

FIGUEROA: Patriot from Pennsylvania. I'm 3 sorry, I don't remember his name. 4 MR. SEGUIN: I yield to the -- actually, he was 5 next. 6 MS. FIGUEROA: National Adjutant. 7 MR. ADKINS: National Adjutant Chuck Adkins 8 from the floor. I understand what the Patriot Smrt 9 was trying to say. But it is actually in Robert's 10 Rules of Order that we do not have to accept the 11 resignation and that we can proceed with the 12 disciplinary hearings as if the individual of the --13 you know, had not resigned. So that actually comes from Robert's Rules. 14 And our current bylaws state, you don't have to 15 16 be present to win, you know. If you don't show up, 17 our current bylaws say they can do the DHP without 18 you. We're not going to compel you to come if you 19 resign, but we can still proceed. Thank you. 20 MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Smrt. 21 MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky, in rebuttal to the 22 previous comments. I was intimately involved, I 23 believe, with the incident because I was one of the 24 individuals charging that person. Not bragging, I'm 25 just saying that I was there. And I know in



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1	subsequent bylaws that was adjusted and changed so
2	that couldn't happen. But it unfortunately did.
3	Like I said, the only thing I'm concerned about
4	is the acceptance, and we just not automatically
5	revert to Robert's Rules when we don't like what our
6	bylaws already encompass and state. We clearly have
7	bylaws in effect that say, if the individual
8	resigns, the individual, obviously, the charges or
9	whatever else is pending, go into suspension. And
10	only if they attempt to reapply, then we bring it
11	back.
12	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot from Pennsylvania.
13	MR. SEGUIN: Shawn Seguin, paying attention. So
14	I'm going to kind of 50/50, and then I have a small
15	little sidebar. But the 50/50 on this is, I think
16	this does need to be reworked just because there's
17	some Hispanic language in it.
18	He's absolutely right that if I quit today,
19	there's nothing you can say. I'm not going to a
20	disciplinary meeting. I'm just walking out the
21	door. Whether or not you accepted this means nothing
22	to me. I disagree with the gentleman. We still
23	need to do the paperwork on the back end. So those
24	in the future, if I try to reapply or there's other
25	assets involved in it, it came to final solution.

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1	So when I reapply, it's like, no, no, no. We
2	already have this on file and went through it. If I
3	choose to leave and not defend myself, that's on me,
4	right? So being charged and going through the
5	process and the absentia, and I can't pronounce that
6	word, so I apologize, that's on me for saying, nope,
7	I'm just out.

So whether or not I can defend myself is me 8 9 saying, yes, I'll be there. But the lines in there 10 about, you know, we have to accept it. I can walk 11 out the door right now and never return and just 12 tell you guys, I'm out. And that's me giving 13 notice. Ideally, we do get notice. We get it done the right way. But I think that there's just some 14 15 semantical language in there that can get cleaned up 16 and it fits.

17 And my little sidebar, it's something I 18 noticed. And I know that there's a Rules Committee 19 person that's going to interrupt me. So just give 20 me a sentence first. Give me a minute to spin 21 around. Just kidding. All right. It's a -- it is 22 a very small thing, right? We ought to say our 23 piece. We can say what we want to say. Ι 24 understand by the Rules of Robert you can step in 25 and interrupt in order, but if you shoved your hand



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1	in my face to grab a mic, that's just being
2	disrespectful. And it wasn't just me happening
3	right now, but it is happening throughout yesterday
4	and today.
5	Can we please give just a common courtesy to
6	our fellow members? I was just standing in line.
7	He did ask her, after I stared at him for a second
8	he was like, oh, wait, do you mind if I step in?
9	I wasn't part of the conversation. A general tap
10	like, hey, do you mind if I do my rebuttal? I can
11	just step back.
12	So I'm not saying don't speak. Don't take your
13	advantage. But let's respect ourselves here. We're
14	brothers and sisters all trying to go in the right
15	direction. Give us a small bit of courtesy and go,
16	hey, do you mind if I grab that mic? And not just
17	snap it out the speaker's face. Because I don't
18	know about you all, but I don't like hands in this
19	area.
20	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Abbey.
21	MR. ABBEY: First, may I acknowledge Patriot
22	Smrt's actions there on the floor. That is the most
23	civil behaviors that I think we fail to acknowledge.
24	We notice the backstabbing often enough, but it's
25	nice to give somebody props for doing the right



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thing for the right reason at the right time. That into my three minutes.

The one thing we forget is, we're forgetting 3 4 the judicial precedence of trial in absentia. Ιf 5 you leave the country, you can still be found quilty 6 in a court, and then, like that, the conviction is 7 still on the record. If somebody chooses not to defend themselves, that's another thing. My point 8 9 is more administrative and parliamentarian. All of 10 this is great, but right now I can pull up 77 names 11 that are still on the national rosters that say, not 12 a member.

I do not see that this addresses a mechanism 13 14 that once a process is completed, that we call the 15 record and whoever preferred the charges, 16 administered the punishment, it needs to happen 17 because we need to get better housekeeping. And the 18 fact that we have somebody from all six regions 19 that's not a member, still getting vote counts, 20 rebate counts. This is wrong. We should never 21 accept that. 22 MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot McIntosh. 23 MR. ADKINS: I would like to yield to Patriot 24 McIntosh. You can go first.

MR. MCINTOSH: No, go ahead.

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1	MR. ADKINS: Okay. I just need to ask
2	permission to speak for about 30 seconds a second
3	time.
4	MS. FIGUEROA: Does everyone allow National
5	Adjutant Adkins to speak for a second time? Any
6	opposed?
7	MR. ADKINS: All right. I one thing I
8	forgot to mention was about the reinstatement
9	because there was nothing in our bylaws that covered
10	the reinstatement. We've had people resign, not
11	under charges, but then later on, wanted to come
12	back, and then say, hey, well, I paid my dues years
13	ago, so just give me my membership back.
14	To me, that's a no-no. If you left for
15	whatever reason and then want to come back in, you
16	should provide the same documents. You may have to
17	pay a higher fee. But, you know, that that's a
18	consequence of your actions from previously. So we
19	just need, you know, to be aware of that. That's
20	why that was put in there. Thank you.
21	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot McIntosh.
22	MR. MCINTOSH: Patriot McIntosh, National
23	Historian. I was on the Bylaws Committee that wrote
24	our current bylaws, and this issue came up, and we
25	had a lot of discussion on it. And one of the

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things that we have noticed is that there was no 1 2 provision for somebody who resigned and then came 3 back in -- tried to come back in trying to avoid 4 charges. The way the bylaws read on the charges, if 5 somebody resigns the package that they have, bring 6 the charges, is maintained by the Adjutant. If the 7 individual comes back and wants in again, the 8 charges resume from the point where they stopped. 9 So there is no problem with somebody coming back in 10 and getting away.

11 Over a period of years, there was a lot of 12 problems. We had a lot of money on lawsuits. And 13 one of them involved, as Patriot Smrt mentioned, 14 somebody who had resigned. To me, if somebody has 15 resigned, and they're no longer wanting to be a 16 member, how can he defend himself if somebody is 17 bringing something up? Because in there, he no 18 longer has rights as a member according to the way 19 this is. So I can only think of one word to describe what this is: Vindictive. 20

MS. FIGUEROA: Call for question? The motion on the floor is to approve resolution 2024-08-NFF, resignation from and reinstatement into the Military Order of the Purple Heart. Anyone who approves, please stand or raise your hand.



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1	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton, motion to
2	approve.
3	MS. FIGUEROA: Any opposed? Any opposed?
4	MR. WITT: Raise your hand one more time.
5	MS. FIGUEROA: Any opposed? Please re-raise
6	your hand, please. Any abstentions? The motion
7	passes with 69 approved, six opposed, seven
8	abstains. Do you have a question, Patriot Hanson,
9	Commander Hanson?
10	MR. HANSON: No, ma'am. I'm waiting for you to
11	tell me I can put my hand down.
12	MS. FIGUEROA: Commander Hanson, you can put
13	your hand down.
14	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You should have waited.
15	MS. FIGUEROA: You know what? I should have.
16	Just let him stand up there the whole time.
17	Resolution number 2024-09-NFF.
18	MR. WITT: All right. Keep it down. Keep it
19	down.
20	MS. FIGUEROA: Prohibition on political
21	endorsements while wearing the MOPH uniform.
22	Resolved that Article 15, To Preserve the Integrity
23	of the Corporation, Section 6, Politics, Section 6,
24	Paragraph A be amended to read, "The Corporation's
25	national region, department, or chapter officers,

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1	elected or appointed, and/or members shall not
2	contribute to, otherwise support or assist, any
3	political party or candidate for public office as a
4	representative of the Military Order of the Purple
5	Heart."

And be it further resolved that Article 15, To 6 7 Preserve the Integrity of the Corporation, Section 8 6, Politics, to be amended by adding Paragraph D. 9 "In accordance with the Article 14, Section 4, no 10 member of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, 11 MOPH, shall wear the MOPH uniform, in whole or part, 12 and/or any item displaying the MOPH logo at any 13 campaign event where a political candidate endorsement can be sought." "In addition, no member 14 who is the candidate themselves shall wear the MOPH 15 16 uniform, in whole or in part, and/or items 17 displaying the MOPH logo while campaigning for a 18 local, state, or federal elected office. Also see 19 Article 14, Section 4."

20 Be it further resolved that Article 14, 21 Uniforms and Supplies, Section 4, Uniforms, be 22 amended by adding Paragraph D. "In accordance with 23 Article 15, Section 6, no member of the Military 24 Order of the Purple Heart, MOPH, shall wear the MOPH 25 uniform, in whole or part, and/or any item



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1	displaying the MOPH logo at any campaign event where
2	a political candidate endorsement can be sought."
3	"No member who is the candidate themself shall wear
4	the MOPH uniform, in whole or in part, and/or item
5	displaying the MOPH logo while campaigning for a
6	local, state, or federal elected office. No member
7	shall wear the MOPH uniform, in whole or in part,
8	and/or item displaying the MOPH logo at any event
9	where it may be construed that MOPH is supporting or
10	bring discredit to the Military Order of the Purple
11	Heart." Patriot Middleton.
12	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate,
13	Department of Georgia. I move that we approve
14	Resolution number 2024-09-NFF.
15	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion to approve. Is there a
16	second?
17	MR. ADKINS: Chuck Adkins, National Adjutant
18	from the floor. I second.
19	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion approved. And second.
20	Discussion.
21	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky. I do want to go on
22	record that I like Ike. It obviously dates me. The
23	whole and in part and I am obviously gravitating
24	towards this, and I appreciate this. I actually ran
25	for both local and state level office, and I was
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1	very judicious and careful on that. So I do like to
2	move forward on that.
3	But technically, my Military Order of the
4	Purple Heart uniform is a blazer, shirt, maybe my
5	regimental tie, not the baldric or the logo of the
6	Military Order of the Purple Heart. But if I have a
7	Purple Heart pinned to my chest, which I earned,
8	that, obviously, is outside the bounds, as long as
9	it's, quote, not the official logo of the Military
10	Order of the Purple Heart. That's my question of
11	clarification to the bench to the bounds.
12	MS. FIGUEROA: I think that is correct. Yes.
13	MR. ADKINS: Yes. Chuck Adkins, National
14	Adjutant. Well, you are correct, Patriot Smrt, that
15	you can wear the medal. You earned that. But there
16	are IRS rules and other rules that prohibit non-
17	profits from engaging in political activities. And
18	we fall under that.
19	In 2021 no, 2022, we had Patriots violating
20	the bylaws as it was currently stating, you know,
21	and making endorsements, and they were caught. I
22	had to because I was the Adjutant, and they sent
23	pictures. So we actually have that. We've actually
24	had Patriots, that were candidates themselves,
25	wearing either all or in part of their MOPH uniform.

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1	We've got pictures of that. And we've just had
2	I'm not going to name which state, but we've just
3	had two in a state up north of Virginia, be seen
4	wearing their MOPH uniform endorsing a political
5	candidate. And that infers or implies that the
6	Order itself is endorsing those individuals, you
7	know, the candidates. If they had just worn their
8	medal, probably nobody would have said anything.
9	But when you've got your hat, your blazer, and the
10	logo on, uh-uh, that's wrong.
11	MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Taylor.
12	MR. TAYLOR: Fred Taylor, Past National
13	Commander. This goes back aways, but when George W.
14	Bush ran for his first presidential election, at the
15	convention, it showed a person with a Purple Heart
16	hat. It didn't say MOPH. It had a purple heart.
17	And some of our members were wearing it. It just
18	says, purple heart, maybe it says, Vietnam veteran
19	or whatever.
20	And it was an uproar because it was a well-
21	known member. I don't know if some of the people
22	was around remember that. He was perfectly legal.
23	You could wear your purple heart. You could wear
24	your purple heart hat. You could wear anything like
25	that. I highly encourage you to do so. Don't

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1	represent yourself with the purple heart go for a
2	Purple Heart logo, though. Just the purple heart.
3	Thank you.
4	MS. FIGUEROA: Call for question. The motion
5	on the floor is to approve Resolution number 2024-
6	09- NFF, Prohibition on Political Endorsements While
7	Wearing the MOPH Uniform. Any approve, please stand
8	or raise your hand.
9	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton, vote to approve.
10	MR. GIBSON: Alan Gibson, Junior Vice
11	Commander, vote to approve.
12	MS. FIGUEROA: Just to make a note, Alan Gibson
13	is Department of Georgia and is checked in online.
14	Any opposed? Any abstentions? The resolution
15	passes. 82 approved, zero opposed, one abstention.
16	MR. ADKINS: Put your hand down, Jack.
17	MS. FIGUEROA: I was going to wanted to see
18	how long he could go. Resolution number 2024-10-
19	NFF, Punishments or Abridgment of Membership Rights.
20	Resolved that Article 15, To Preserve the Integrity
21	of the Corporation, Section 13, Discipline,
22	Transfer, and Expulsion of Members, Paragraph A,
23	Charges, be amended to read, "One, no member or
24	associate member of the Military Order of the Purple
25	Heart of the USA, Inc.

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1	shall be punished or have any membership rights
2	abridged without a disciplinary hearing panel, and
3	in which a recommended abridging punishment,
4	suspension, or expulsion is upheld by the NEC
5	between National Conventions or the Supreme Body
6	during National Conventions." "Two, punishments or
7	an abridgment of membership may be imposed for the
8	following reasons: A, intentional, willful, and/or
9	malicious violations of the constitution and/or
10	bylaws of the MOPH. B, misfeasance or malfeasance.
11	C, refusal to comply with the lawful order as
12	defined in the constitution and/or bylaws of a
13	Commander or the National Convention Supreme Body.
14	D, willful misconduct and/or malicious violation of
15	the oath of office." "One, repeated violations of
16	the oath of office are considered willful
17	misconduct, which is chargeable under this
18	subsection. Two, the repeated violations do not
19	have to be from the same part of the oath but can be
20	used to establish a pattern of willful misconduct.
21	Three, a claim of ignorance of the bylaws is not a
22	defense against willfully violating the oath of
23	office. "3E, actions which bring discredit to the
24	Order. 3F, convictions of a crime involving theft
25	or moral turpitude. The current Paragraph A2



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becomes A3." Patriot Middleton. 1 2 MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate, 3 Department of Georgia. For the purpose of 4 discussion, I move that we accept this Resolution 5 number 2024-10-NFF. 6 MS. FIGUEROA: The motion is to approve. Any 7 second? 8 Second for the purpose of MR. SMRT: 9 discussion. Smrt, Kentucky Delegate. 10 MS. FIGUEROA: Second. Any discussion? 11 MR. SMRT: If I'm not mistaken, at the Bylaws 12 Committee last night, which I wished everybody would 13 have attended -- Smrt, obviously, Kentucky, for lack 14 of proper annotation of written Section 14 when it 15 should have been Section 6, that was corrected and brought back to the floor as of 9:15 this morning in 16 17 order for the 24-hour clock to start. Because 18 spelling and grammar may be adjusted by the 19 committee for assistance to make it, you know, nice, 20 but they cannot change the substance. 21 I'm sorry, but if you'll note the actual 22 numbers, whether I like it or not, under the resolve 23 for Article 15, we have one, we have two, (2), then 24 sub- paragraphs Alfa, Bravo, Charlie, and Delta, and 25 then it goes back to redo the numbers of (1), (2),

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1	(3), and then subordinate Echo and Foxtrot. It is a
2	format issue. And I'm not trying to be the turd
3	blossom that I actually am. I'm just pointing out
4	that it was considered a flaw for a single number in
5	Arizona, and they were able to get online and
6	correct. But as formatted, this just doesn't read.
7	And if we approve it, it's going to be crazy
8	because we can't change it without the individuals,
9	obviously, going back and readjusting it because the
10	numbering is just not right. And the number was
11	just not right for Arizona, but they put it on the
12	floor at 9:15 this morning.
13	MR. OLIVAREZ: Robert Olivarez, Committee
14	Chairman. I'm going to withdraw 2024 is that
15	correct?
16	MS. FIGUEROA: Yes.
17	MR. OLIVAREZ:10.
18	MR. FERGUSON: All right. Guess what? I think
19	it's break time. Yeah. All right. So, Sergeant-
20	at-Arms.
21	MR. WITT: Everyone please stand. Face the
22	flag. Attention. Salute. Two.
23	MR. FERGUSON: Come back in here at 3:05.

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1	And you know what? One of our other legends are
2	standing right up here. And Katie Sorge (phonetic)
3	is in that group. If you haven't been around, you
4	don't know what I'm talking about, trust me, the
5	legacy of a great Sergeant-at-Arms and corporal of
6	the Armed Forces. Thank you.
7	MR. FERGUSON: Thank you, PNC Taylor. Let's
8	give him a round of warm applause for our National
9	Sergeant-at-Arms.
10	MR. WITT: It's just something I've always had
11	a passion to do, and I still
12	MR. FERGUSON: He's got that passion, and he
13	said he's done it for so many years. But I can tell
14	you this, he also corrected me getting on and off
15	the stage. So I knew I had something done right, so
16	which I had no problem.
17	MR. MIDDLETON: He was my chapter commander.
18	MR. FERGUSON: He was your chapter commander.
19	He kept you in line, too, right?
20	MR. GARCIA: Kenny started when I was three.
21	MR. FERGUSON: He started when you were three.
22	All right. All right. So I know they're doing some
23	raffle tickets for some hats. So if you haven't got
24	one, they're coming by to get you for that. And I'm
25	fixing to say, we're getting ready to continue on.

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1	I know we're behind. But if we can move forward on
2	some of these things, we'll get on time, because
3	we've got a few things that you're I'll tell you
4	what.
5	Before I do something that was on this, if you
6	don't mind, because I know the time frame, he just
7	actually just walked in the door. I'll catch him so
8	he doesn't have time to sit down yet. Mr. Al. He's
9	looking at me real quick like, wow.
10	MR. LIPHEART: I didn't hear you.
11	MR. FERGUSON: Didn't hear me.
12	MR. LIPHEART: No.
13	MR. FERGUSON: That's good. Would you like to
14	come over here to the stage?
15	MR. LIPHEART: Sure.
16	MR. FERGUSON: All right. If you all don't
17	mind, we just have a couple minutes here. The next
18	Commander in Chief of the VFW, Al Lipheart. I
19	personally have known him, I guess, for several
20	years now. I think we've become more as friends and
21	understanding each other. But we both had the
22	vision at this time, and I wasn't even I didn't
23	even make a Junior Vice yet, okay, had the vision of
24	maybe how to get Purple Heart and the VFW to work
25	together. And we've both been just collaborating on

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1	this for quite a while.
2	So please give your attention. And let's give
3	a round of warm applause for the next yes,
4	absolutely, the chapter warm applause for the
5	next commander-in-chief of the VFW.
6	MR. LIPHEART: Thank you, Comrade Commander or
7	Patriot Commander, because we all say different
8	things. Can you see me?
9	MR. PICKART: The mic.
10	MR. LIPHEART: Yeah, I asked could you see me
11	because I but I was more interested in could you
12	hear me. And now I know you couldn't, so now I know
13	you can. How's this? Okay, good. All right.
14	Again, thank you for allowing me to come back to
15	visit with you and have the honor of standing here
16	at the podium with you.
17	When I came here last year, we talked about an
18	MOU that we agreed upon to provide opportunities for
19	members of the Military Order of the Purple Heart to
20	receive accreditation for service officer work
21	through the Veterans of Foreign Wars. You must be a
22	VFW member in order to receive that accreditation.
23	Who cares? You can go help your MOPH brothers and
24	sisters with their claims through that
25	accreditation.

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1	Ernie and I, Past National Commander, we had a
2	conversation now, and I just came from a Zoom
3	meeting. Going to put him in touch with Mike
4	Figlioli, who is the director of our veterans
5	military service, so they can talk. I understand
6	that there is a there is a VFW national
7	department member in the I believe it's Lake
8	Park. I think it's Bill McGraw (phonetic) is
9	there you are. We were talking about you outside.
10	It looks like I talked to Mike, and Mike is
11	going to talk to the PNC, and I think we're going to
12	be able to pull the trigger and get that done get
13	the first one done. And then we'll see how that
14	goes to move on to the next one. So that's looking
15	very favorably. So that brings you up to date on
16	that.
17	Now, I don't know how many VFW members that are
18	in here that are going to the VFW National
19	Convention. There is a change coming in the Manual
20	of Procedure concerning the Purple Heart Medal. The
21	Purple Heart Medal, what's being proposed is the
22	Purple Heart Medal is eligibility for the Veterans
23	of Foreign Wars. Long, long overdue. So what that
24	means and I expect to have pushback. But what
25	that means is that it doesn't say you must be

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deployed overseas in a hostile zone in order to receive the Purple Heart because that's what happened at Fort Hood, and at the recruiting in Chattanooga, and the others. In my position -- and I'm asking you when you're in attendance, and hopefully you're a delegate, come to the mic and speak up. Support this.

8 What the verbiage says for the -- I guess for 9 the CIV, there's no requirement for hostile fire. 10 To get a Combat Medic Badge, there's no requirement 11 for hostile fires for being there. For Combat 12 Action, there's no requirement. So why is there a 13 requirement for a Purple Heart? It shouldn't be. 14 It's another -- you can't get a Purple Heart unless 15 it's been caused by enemy action that you've been treated for. That's what the -- that's what the reg 16 17 says.

18 So we're putting it -- there's a listing of 19 three pages under Campaign Medals, Service Medals, 20 Expeditionary Medals that are qualifying. And the 21 last item for eligibility is hostile fire for 22 imminent danger pay. There's no dates. Right 23 underneath that is going the Purple Heart note. 24 There won't be any dates on there. So hopefully 25 we're going to be able to get this done so that

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1	those who have received this Purple Heart are
2	respected for the service and sacrifice that they
3	made. And you certainly should have been eligible
4	to be a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. And
5	that foreign wars part. That was what a lot of the
6	pushback comes on it.
7	But this is 2024. The enemy is here. They're
8	not you don't have to go overseas. So it's a
9	global war on terror, and that needs to be
10	recognized. And that's why the Purple Heart Medal
11	is being received.
12	So, again, that's all I wanted to share with
13	you. Just know that I'm going to be pushing, and
14	as with the MOPH and other veteran service
15	organizations. If it doesn't pass this year, I'm
16	going to do it again next year. Only next year,
17	I'll be the guy. And I think I could probably push
18	it a little harder. But we're going to we're
19	going to get this done.
20	So, again, it's truly an honor to be here
21	amongst you, to be with you, to be one of you. So
22	thank you very much. That's all I wanted.
23	MR. FERGUSON: So one thing I will tell you
24	there, I will be there at the National Convention of
25	the VFW and be representing this. So that's one

5	Resolved that Article 15, To Preserve the Integrity
6	of the Corporation, Section 13, Discipline,
7	Transfer, and Expulsion of Members, Paragraph E3 be
8	amended to read, "Any member placed on suspension
9	shall be removed from any elected or appointed
10	officer or committee positions at all levels and
11	from membership of the Order for a period of not
12	more than one year from the date of receipt by the
13	member as determined by the any shipping service
14	entity, certified mail return receipt requested. As
15	a suspension is an abridgment of membership, it
16	shall be the responsibility of the National
17	Commander and National Adjutant to ensure the term
18	and conditions of the suspension are enforced."
19	And be it further resolved that Article 15, To
20	Preserve the Integrity of the Corporation, Section
21	13, Discipline, Transfer, and Expulsion of Members,
22	Paragraph E4, Restriction, be amended to read, "Any
23	member placed on restrictions shall be allowed to
24	remain a chapter member with a voice and a vote but
25	shall be restricted from holding any elected or

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1	appointed officer or committee position at all
2	levels of the Order for a specific length of time or
3	permanently for life." "The member shall have a
4	voice but no vote at the department, region, or
5	national levels during the period of restriction.
6	As the restriction is not an abridgment of
7	membership, it shall be the responsibility of the
8	Commander and Adjutant at the level in which the
9	restriction was imposed to ensure the term and
10	conditions of the restriction are enforced." Do we
11	have a motion on the floor for this resolution?
12	Patriot Middleton.
13	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Delegate from
14	Department of Georgia. I move for discussion
15	purposes that we move to approve Resolution number
16	2024-11-NFF.
17	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion to approve. Do we have a
18	second?
19	MR. SMRT: Second. Smrt, Delegate, Kentucky.
20	MS. FIGUEROA: We have a motion to approve and
21	a second. Any discussion? Patriot Smrt.
22	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky Delegate. In the
23	whereas, obviously, which was not indicated, it does
24	put a sort of date stamp in of May 2022. It was an
25	opinion because it clearly states it was opined by

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1	the then- National Judge Advocate. Do we have an
2	opinion that was given to the command and/or the
3	committee by the current Judge Advocate? Because I
4	think that might be two different people, if I'm not
5	mistaken, or maybe I could be corrected on that.
6	Someone is still eating a cookie.
7	MR. FERGUSON: Sorry, eating my cookie. I also
8	plugged up some of my ears. Can you say part of
9	that again, Patriot Smrt?
10	MR. SMRT: Yes. It was referenced in the
11	whereas, it was May 2022. It was opined by the
12	National Judge Advocate, who obviously makes
13	opinions and recommendations to the command and then
14	backs away, and it is then the Commander to make the
15	decision. But do we have the "opinion" ready to the
16	command or the current Bylaws Committee of the
17	current National Judge Advocate?
18	MR. FERGUSON: I think that is a positive that
19	we do have that. I'm going to verify that again
20	that we got an opinion of the current National
21	Adjutant on this resolution. Yes.
22	MR. SMRT: Thank you. And then point of order,
23	in the future, and this is just an annoying, it is
24	easier, and I would encourage, having sat on those
25	boards in the past, you have under Subparagraph Echo

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1	3, "any shipping service entity" bold and
2	highlighted. But that was already accepted in the
3	previous iterations.
4	And right after that, anything that's new and
5	changed for the alternate for the amendment, if we
6	can clearly identify those as changes by using
7	either bold, italics, underlined, things like that,
8	it helps the membership understand what's actually
9	changed. But beyond that, that is more
10	administrative. And I encourage adoption of this
11	amendment.
12	MS. FIGUEROA: Point taken. Thank you. Any
13	further discussion? Call for question? The motion
14	on the floor is to approve Resolution 2024-11-NFF,
15	Restriction and Suspension. All approve, please
16	stand or raise your hand.
17	MR. GIBSON: Alan Gibson, Junior Vice
18	Commander. Approve.
19	MR. LEIGHTON: Larry Leighton. Move to
20	approve.
21	MR. WITT: Guys, put your hands up.
22	MS. FIGUEROA: Any opposed? Any abstain? The
23	motion passes with 81 approved, zero opposed, one
24	abstained. Moving on to Resolution number 2024-12-
25	NFF, Regarding Rules of the National Convention.

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1	MR. ABBEY: Point of privilege. Point of
2	privilege. Ed Abbey, Parliamentarian. The motion
3	earlier from the Body was that we divide for voting.
4	But we can go ahead and, by the Body, go ahead and
5	select to go back to by acclimation and speed this
6	process up, unless there is the Body not wanting to
7	speed this up.
8	AUDIENCE: Speed it up.
9	MR. ABBEY: Somebody has to make a motion. I
10	cannot.
11	MS. FIGUEROA: Does anyone want to make a
12	motion to
13	MR. FERGUSON: Got to get a person to second,
14	so I need somebody behind you.
15	MR. ABBEY: Can't have two motions
16	MR. REED: Senior Vice Commander Victor Reed
17	from Oklahoma. I make a motion that we speed this
18	process up. Period.
19	MR. WITT: Gary Witt, Sergeant-at-Arms. Make a
20	motion I'll second the motion.
21	MR. TAYLOR: And I second that.
22	MS. FIGUEROA: We have a motion on the floor
23	and a second, any discussion? PNC Taylor.
24	MR. TAYLOR: Past National Commander Taylor. In
25	the past what we've done is, we've taken a visual

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1	count, and unless there was a challenge from the
2	floor that says I want a head count, you just say it
3	looks to me like the ayes have it or the nays have
4	it. And then if it if it is disputed, do the
5	head count. No questions, just acknowledge it.
6	MS. FIGUEROA: Thank you.
7	MR. MCINTOSH: Nick McIntosh, National
8	Historian. Past National Commander Fred is right.
9	It's a lot easier if you just, when you have them
10	stand, put their hands up. And if it looks like
11	it's the majority, you can go ahead and do that.
12	But once you get in a yelling contest, it's who can
13	yell the loudest.
14	MS. FIGUEROA: Thank you. Hanson, put your
15	hand down. Resolution number 2024-12-NFF, Regarding
16	Rules of the National Convention. Resolved that
17	Article there you go, I'm sorry, that Article 9,
18	National Convention, Section 5, Rules of the
19	National Convention, Paragraph N be amended to read,
20	"Article 9, National Convention, Section 5, Rules of
21	the National Convention, Paragraph N,
22	recommendations for consideration and action of the
23	convention shall be in the form of resolutions, as
24	advanced by chapters, departments, or official
25	committees." "Resolutions to amend the bylaws shall

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1	have been first proposed by the Department
2	Convention, Department Executive Committee, and
3	National Bylaws Committee for the NEC. Also, see"
4	excuse me, "Article 18, Amendments Section 1,
5	Amendments, Paragraph A1." Patriot McIntosh?
6	MR. MCINTOSH: National Historian McIntosh.
7	From experience, I know some information I'll
8	discuss it later, but I move that this be
9	disapproved.
10	MS. FIGUEROA: The motion on the floor is to
11	disapprove Resolution 2024-1-2 NFF. Is there a
12	second?
13	MR. MIDDLETON: Middleton, Delegate from
14	Georgia. I second.
15	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion is to disapprove this
16	resolution, and a second. Any discussion?
17	MR. ADKINS: Chuck Adkins, National Adjutant
18	from the floor. The reason why this amendment was
19	put forward is because it resolves a flaw, you know,
20	between Article 9 and Article 18. It makes them
21	identical. Because one says one doesn't say it
22	has to be signed, dated and so forth, and the other
23	one did. So
24	MR. FERGUSON: The mic.
25	MR. ADKINS: this resolves the flaw.
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1	MR. MCINTOSH: When we did the 2016, 2017
2	complete review of the bylaws, which took over 3,000
3	hours, what happened is, we had a lot of things like
4	the current proposed amendment, where you have long
5	paragraphs and long sentences. And there were a lot
6	of mistakes made in particularly in Article 15,
7	Section 13, where people did not follow step by step
8	by step.
9	So what we resolved, as a committee, that we
10	would take any incident or any bylaw that requires
11	multiple steps, we would put in multiple steps like
12	it currently reads. And what our criteria was, we
13	attempted to make it idiot-proof. We never
14	succeeded. But anyway, that is the reason that it is
15	currently in the version it is.
16	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Smrt?
17	MR. SMRT: Patriot Smrt, Kentucky, mirroring,
18	obviously, my mentor. There has been a nasty habit,
19	and I think it's more laziness, not, obviously, by
20	commission as much as it is omission. At one time,
21	we used to have the constitution bylaws, rituals,
22	you know, things like that.
23	If you look at the two different sections that
24	we're trying to address, one specifically talks
25	about resolutions. Resolutions has been, shall we

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1	say, lazily used as the moniker for amendments. Two
2	distinctive things. And by the way this is written,
3	to say parentheses, also see Article 18, Amendment
4	Section 1, you know, Amendments Paragraph 1A, that
5	specifically addresses only the procedure for how to
6	amend the bylaws. Sometimes we had a separate in
7	the past, separate Resolutions Committee.
8	Sometimes, without that being designated at
9	convention, it's fell upon the shoulders of the
10	Bylaws Committee to conduct that. But resolutions
11	are different because they have the force of nature
12	for one year.
13	Bylaws changes require the two-thirds majority
14	obviously, change the way we do business. And
15	presently, the Article, you know, 18, Amendment
16	Section 1, amendments of the Paragraph Alfa 1, talk
17	about how to amend the bylaw. It does not talk
18	about resolutions. The previous iteration that was
19	trying to be changed was talking under Article 9,
20	Section 5, Resolutions. I resolve that on this day,
21	such and such. And we all, by simple majority vote,
22	by acclimation, say for one year, that's the way we
23	feel, and that's the way the order is moving
24	forward.
25	We have to be very careful not to interchange



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1	those monikers and those titles or those specific
2	language. So therefore, I'm asking that this seems
3	to be fatally put together by convoluting resolution
4	with amendment. And I caution, you know, that we
5	should not do that. Because as the parliamentary
6	says Parliamentarian says, once you start doing
7	something, then you're sort of reiterating and
8	enforcing something that is not authentic and
9	legitimate. Thank you.
10	MR. OLIVAREZ: Robert Olivarez, Bylaws Chair.
11	I'm going to withdraw 2024-12.
12	MS. FIGUEROA: Resolution 2024-12-NFF has been
13	withdrawn by the Bylaws Chairman. We move on to
14	Resolution number 2024-13, Terms of Office, Term of
15	Office National Commander, National Senior Vice
16	Commander, and National Junior Vice Commander.
17	Resolved that Article 10, National Officers, Section
18	4, Term of Office, Paragraph B be changed to read,
19	"The National Commander, the National Senior Vice
20	Commander, or the National Junior Vice Commander may
21	succeed themself by re-election to a second full
22	term. They cannot not serve more than two
23	consecutive terms if re-elected to a second term."
24	"If said National Commander, National Senior Vice
25	Commander, or National Junior Vice Commander are



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1	considering serving a second term, said officers
2	should notify, in writing, by April 1st of the year
3	prior to the National Convention, through the
4	National Adjutant, who will then notify the body of
5	the order of said notice, by April 5th of said year.
6	Said written notice can be by digital means. Said
7	officer's position for the second term must be
8	nominated from the floor during the nomination
9	procedure at the National Convention." Patriot
10	Wetzel.
11	MR. WETZEL: Yes. Senior Vice Commander,
12	California, Raymond Wetzel. I make a motion to
13	disapprove this resolution.
14	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion on the floor is to
15	disapprove. Is there a second?
16	MR. MIDDLETON: Middleton, Delegate from
17	Georgia. I second it.
18	MS. FIGUEROA: There's a disapproval motion and
19	a second. Any discussion?
20	MR. MIDDLETON: Middleton, Georgia. This has
21	been tried before, and I know that a lot of the PNCs
22	would probably agree that having a second term, in
23	many cases, would be great because it would give
24	them an opportunity, that second year, to fulfill
25	some of the projects and such that they want to do.
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However, this really is going to bog down the 1 2 procedures of leadership, where people go through the -- hopefully go through the various chairs and 3 4 progress.

5 So it -- it's been my personal experience that 6 if you're going through the chairs, say from Region 7 Commander, to Junior, to Senior, and hopefully then 8 to National Commander, that -- that is a learning 9 process, as you sit at each level. I can tell you 10 from personal experience that being on a committee, 11 being one of the Junior, Senior Vice Commanders, 12 every one of them is a learning opportunity.

13 And no matter how much you think you know about 14 how this organization works, you're going to learn a 15 heck of a lot in the year when you sit in a chair in one of the Finance Committees or the Publications 16 17 Committee or the Bylaws Committee, what have you. 18 So to me, the mentoring thing or the learning thing 19 is, as you go through the chairs.

20 So the junior vice is learning and watching how 21 the senior and the commander are working in the 22 programs and such. And hopefully that leadership 23 team is coordinating with each other. And they're 24 all lockstep, more or less, at least able to voice 25 their opinions but, basically, cohesive in the plan



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1	of action as the Order moves forward.
2	And then as you move from junior to senior,
3	you're developing your own thoughts and your
4	leadership style and the programs that you want to
5	develop if you are lucky enough to be elected to be
6	the national commander. So although there is a lot
7	to be said for the thought that you get a two-year
8	term, I think we are smarter to just keep the one-
9	year term and go through the mentoring process and
10	such. So I would recommend that we disapprove this.
11	MS. FIGUEROA: Senior Vice Wetzel.
12	MR. WETZEL: Yeah. This is Raymond Wetzel
13	again, California, Senior Vice. I know what the
14	intent is. However, we do have good commanders.
15	We've had not so good commanders. Just like has
16	been said, right now it's working. And we stand to
17	lose younger patriots who are in line, that if they
18	had to do a total of six years of waiting to get to
19	become a commander, they might be burnt out or just
20	unavailable after that point in time.
21	And now the Order has invested five years of
22	them setting up there and trying to learn. But then
23	on the sixth year, for whatever reason, they become
24	unavailable. So that is the reason why, from the
25	start, that I have disapproved this. And I feel

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1	that if the wheel is not broken, don't fix it.
2	Thank you.
3	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Eggelston?
4	MR. EGGELSTON: National Service Director
5	Eggelston. You know, it's not even something that
6	perplexes me. It's something that's reality. Let
7	me break it down to you to simply hey, Florida
8	Department of Florida, step to the side one sec,
9	thank you, sir, before I come up there and throw an
10	orange at your leg.
11	Let's put it this way. You know, the next
12	senior vice commander to come into play and becomes
13	the commander, do you not know that commander will
14	not get a chance to even have his footprint, or her
15	footprint, or its footprint, until, at best, six
16	months into their job? Because they're trying to
17	clean up the junk from the last commander, or
18	they're trying to get their foot set from the last
19	commander. All right?
20	If you want some type of civilized
21	identification as a commander, I think it requires
22	at least as a national commander, I don't agree
23	with all the other two that comes behind, you know.
24	All three have to sit in place. I think that's
25	vulnerable. But the commander, if he's doing or

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1	she's doing a great job, they have that option of
2	the second year.
3	We can always say no. No, they're not good
4	enough. It's not automatic. That option of the
5	second year is to do greater things and have their
6	own identity. That's the reason why I love that
7	because you give you a chance to change the destiny
8	of the whole community. To give us a good
9	footprint, to change the tide from where it's at now
10	or where it was, you know.
11	Let's do this thing the right way. Let's use
12	common sense. Sometimes it takes two, not one year.
13	Because I'm still cleaning up the stuff that Carder
14	had to do last year. And he just caught on to his
15	own identity. When was it, Carder, when you caught
16	on to? Around what? Probably April? No. No, no,
17	I'm being real. Probably around, you didn't have
18	your own identity until probably January or
19	February, correct?
20	MR. FERGUSON: 30th June 2024.
21	MR. EGGELSTON: You know something? You wait
22	until I catch you off that stage.
23	MR. MIDDLETON: August of '23.
24	MR. EGGELSTON: All right. Roger that. But
25	you know, you want to be able to stand on your own

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1	foot. But you have to clean up stuff from the last
2	commander. It's not a cut dog system. You come in
3	and everything just goes to the back. No. You got
4	to pick up and you got to move with the flow. It's
5	a wave. So to stop that wave, and I don't want to
6	take too much time, you want to have your own
7	identity. So that's why I'm with that.
8	Now you can go back to it, big guy from
9	Florida, you throw that other guy out the way.
10	That's all I have to say.
11	MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Taylor?
12	MR. TAYLOR: Past National Commander Taylor. I
13	want to make a couple comments for the delegation to
14	ponder, that's all. I I'm not offering a
15	position. But I know when I was elected, I met with
16	the National Adjutant after being elected. I said
17	his name was John Curry (phonetic). I said,
18	John, we're going to start these projects
19	immediately. And he looked at me and says,
20	Commander, you can't.
21	Now, I don't see Commander Ferguson going like
22	this, but about one minute, I'll be surprised. I
23	said, what do you mean, we can't? He said, you got
24	four major mandated and funded programs that are not
25	completed that have to be done left over from the

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previous administration. We started on those, we finished those in December. I started my stuff in January. We worked on it until May, when all the conventions started, the party conventions, we continued up until the convention. We just got them ready to be in place. The next Commander came in and said, everything he worked on, Fred Taylor, we're stopping.

9 All the things we had going, we stopped. So my 10 point is this. You barely get your stuff started if 11 you inherit a bunch of stuff from a previous thing. 12 And then your stuff ends before you really get a 13 traction with it. So it's just something to ponder. 14 And I'm not even suggesting one way or the other, 15 I'm just saying it's something we all need to 16 consider. Thank you for the good of the Order. 17 MS. FIGUEROA: Commander Wertheim? 18 Craig Wertheim, Commander of the MR. WERTHEIM: 19 Department of Florida. So I served on trade 20 association boards similar to this for many years on 21 the board. And then I moved up and was the Junior 22 Vice President, then Vice President, then they 23 switched it to two year terms. So I served two 24 years as the Vice President. Then I was two years 25 as the President and then two years as the advisor

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2 And we were all, great, this is good. We're 3 going to have two years to be able to shape the 4 board how we wanted to do it. It was a long, four-5 year process. And then another two years as the 6 Advisor. Now, I'm still on the board because I'm 7 passionate about the industry, that's my civilian 8 career. But it is a long process, and you do get 9 burnt out.

One year, especially as a volunteer 10 11 organization, you got to hit the ground running. 12 And you should really use your two years coming, 13 your year as a Junior Vice and Senior Vice, and you 14 should have a game plan coming in. If you don't 15 have your game plan coming in, as the Senior Vice, 16 to hit the ground running, then you're probably not 17 ready to become the National Commander. And we, as 18 a Body, have made a mistake.

Whether you're coming from the floor running for the National Commander position, or you're coming from the seat to the right of the Commander now, you've got to be ready for the job. And if you haven't been all year getting the information, gathering the information, and you're ready for that position, you're setting yourself up for failure no



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1	matter what.
2	So I think that one year is probably enough.
3	Two years, it's a lot of work. It's a big country.
4	And you're going to get burnt out. And you're not
5	going to do yourself any good. And you're not going
6	to do the Order any good for that second year. But
7	you got to be prepared for it. And if you're not
8	prepared for it, you're not good to yourself, you're
9	not good to the Order. Thank you, sir.
10	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot McGinnis.
11	MR. MCGINNIS: William McGinnis, Senior Vice,
12	Louisiana. I think this is actually a good idea.
13	As anybody that's ever been in a leadership
14	position, when you first step into those shoes,
15	you're not going to hit the ground running. You're
16	not going to have everything figured out and know
17	what you're doing. So by the time you do figure it
18	out, you're moving out.
19	So a second year, it is not a guarantee, you
20	know. We still, as a Body, have to re-elect, but it
21	gives that person an opportunity to do what they
22	want to do to improve. And this I feel like we
23	do a lot of things because that's the way they were
24	done. And it's, honestly, as a younger person in
25	here, it's time to change some things. And I think

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1	this is a good thing to change. And if they're
2	going to get burned out, and they're not up for the
3	task, don't re-elect them or don't try to go for a
4	second year.
5	MS. FIGUEROA: Commander Anderson.
6	MR. T. ANDERSON: Okay. Preaching to the
7	Commander Terry Anderson. I'm going to say a bad
8	word, so don't throw me out, thanks. When we first
9	started, when I first came in, we had a group called
10	the Foundation. You went through the steps, one,
11	two, three, you jumped into a seat on the
12	Foundation, and life was blissful.
13	We don't have that anymore. We have nothing
14	past the Commander's position. One of the things
15	that needs to be done and has been reiterated by
16	some of the younger men in this organization, and I
17	approve, we've heard the statement, we've tried this
18	before. If it ain't broke, don't fix it. Those are
19	all nice statements. But in this organization, we
20	need business acumen for our leadership people that
21	know their way around and can get things done.
22	What we have to do is give them time. Time to
23	grow and prosper in their position. By going one
24	year, it just doesn't work. Now, here's the thing.
25	One person might come in and in one year, that's all



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1	they want, well and good. But each time they're
2	going, let's say it's two years for the Commander
3	and two years for these, they're growing in their
4	position. They're getting more proficient. They're
5	becoming a better excuse me, a better junior
6	commander, a better senior commander.
7	So am I getting close to my time? Okay. I
8	just think that by utilizing good commanders, we as
9	an Order grow. We've had some really bad
10	commanders. I was just going to tell you, we've had
11	some really lousy commanders, and they've caused us
12	harm, and they shouldn't even have been in there in
13	the first place.
14	What I would like to see is us choose our
15	commanders very wisely, with the idea that when we
16	put them into that bottom slot, or if they step up
17	and become commander, that they have the ability to
18	lead us and not just put the damn hat on and say,
19	I'm the Commander. Those that chase the hat, I
20	don't want them. I don't want them. I'll fight
21	against them. I want to see people that work within
22	the Order, that put their time into the Order.
23	Three minutes? Three seconds?
24	MR. WITT: Seconds.
25	MR. J. ANDERSON: I'm done.

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1	MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Garcia?
2	MR. GARCIA: Thank you. PNC Garcia. On this
3	bylaw amendment, I don't think people understand
4	what it actually says. This this is just giving
5	the commander an opportunity, and the senior and the
6	junior, it's an option, just like the chapters and
7	departments. It doesn't change. Right now,
8	everybody is like, well, it's six years. It's not
9	six years.

10 If you have a commander that's no good, you get 11 rid of him. Senior Vice can run against the 12 commander if the commander decides I want to stay 13 for another year. Senior Vice can run against that person. There's nothing saying that they can't. 14 So 15 the whole idea about them being there for six years 16 as Junior Vice, six years to move up to commander, 17 that's not what it is.

This is saying that it gives them an option. 18 19 Because right now, we're in a critical position 20 because these commanders are sitting there trying to 21 make this organization better. From my time from 22 being National Commander during COVID year, no money 23 from the Foundation -- a little bit, but then it 24 just went -- everything went down. And we started, 25 I mean, we have to start from the bottom. We're



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getting better, but we need to get there.

2 Some of these commanders got to get that 3 opportunity and that chance. Like PNC Siebels, PNC 4 Taylor, all the other PNCs around here, we had great 5 PNCs in the past. But they didn't get that 6 opportunity to continue making this organization 7 better. We had millions of dollars that were given 8 to us by the Foundation. We don't have them more.

9 So, again, this is just giving them an option. 10 So for myself, I always said -- I always said, why 11 is it that a national portion of the organization is 12 different from the department and the chapter. 13 Because there's chapter commanders that have been 14 there for five years. They're doing great things. 15 There's Department Commanders that have been there 16 -- some of you guys here have been there for five 17 years. It doesn't change to anything. National 18 organization, we don't have anybody here.

Commander Carder, it took you, by January, you're barely getting yourself -- your feet wet. Come in -- you're not coming in and hitting the ground running because you can't. You got things you got to do. Doug, when we were in office, when we came in, we had to attend the Foundation meetings. That took us away from our job. So by



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1	the time we got to be able to do like, Hurricane
2	Harvey, all that stuff, it put me it got me busy.
3	But again, this is I don't think anybody
4	understands this bylaw or this amendment. It's
5	not giving them two years. It's giving them an
6	option to run for a second year. That's all it is.
7	Thank you.
8	MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Rivera.
9	MR. RIVERA: PNC Rivera. As a past National
10	Commander, the I can tell you it's a tough year.
11	It is some within by January, February time
12	frame, I guarantee you, the stuff you start getting,
13	no matter what you do, half the people are going to
14	be mad, half of them are going to be happy. No
15	matter, you can give them a pot of gold, and they
16	would say the pot is the wrong color.
17	This is a you know, some people probably
18	I think this is an excellent option, based on the
19	fact that they have the opportunity to state, I'm
20	going to put my hat in the ring to run again. So
21	what that's going to do now is, if you're a junior,
22	you're a senior, and as you're moving through, the
23	days of you just kind of hanging out and not getting
24	all the stuff done that needs to get done, well, if
25	you do that, because I've seen quite a few through

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1	my time, if you do that, that commander stays there.
2	There's going to be more time. You know, and I
3	can tell you, people will run against you. I think
4	this makes it way more competitive for all three of
5	those positions, way more competitive for those
6	three positions. There should be no reason why
7	that, if there's a person in one of those positions,
8	why somebody else doesn't step up and run against
9	him. Even if it's the junior trying to go to the
10	senior, the senior trying to go to the commander, or
11	somebody else coming in as a junior.
12	So the organization needs to get people that
13	are a lot more business savvy, business minded, and
14	people that are willing to put in this is a full-
15	time job when you're a junior, senior, or the
16	national commander, the National Adjutant or the
17	National Finance Officer. It's a full-time job.
18	For free. Thank you.
19	MS. FIGUEROA: National Commander.
20	MR. FERGUSON: National Commander from the
21	floor. You know, this one, I heard that this
22	amendment that was supposed to be going forward.
23	And, you know, my heart kind of went up. And it's
24	like, wow, you know, would this do anything any
25	good?

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1If you all remember when I was at the2convention last year, I put out SMART goals, what I3was wanting to get accomplished. And those goals4are on there. I can tell you, and I hate to say5this in front of you, I feel like a failure because6I did not get all my goals done. But we got a lot7of goals going forward.

8 Because here's the thing about it, it's the 9 team that you line up with. If we don't get the 10 right people in the right positions, you are not 11 going to accomplish your task. You know, they said, 12 when I got my feet wet. Well, I hate to tell you, 13 when I jumped in here, I was covered up to --14 something in brown all the way up to about my chest 15 or neck. And I'm not sure what all that stuff was, 16 but it didn't smell too good.

17 But the key thing is that I turned around and 18 dug it out and got us up and going. Several 19 comments had been saying our ship was going down. 20 And what I did was I turned around and took that 21 ship and leveled us back out and get us going into 22 the forward direction. So the key thing would be, if 23 you're looking at this, I can tell you this 24 honestly, and the Senior Vice and Junior Vice and 25 all the command staff can tell you, they were

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involved in every step that I did.

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2 That's what a commander has got to do. Involve 3 your team to let them know. I didn't turn around 4 and make all the decisions just by myself, even 5 though I got the ultimate authority of that. But I 6 want to make sure that everybody gives me the proper 7 instructions of what we have to have, and ideas of 8 moving things forward. That's the key of this, the 9 moving forward.

And, again, if the commander is good for two years, I understand that. That's fine, and that's if you got the team there. But what happens if somebody else can't make that? Who can be a part of that team? So I can tell you this, you know, it's no credit on me, it's the team that's here.

And I can tell you this, the only way we're going to move it -- and I can guarantee you one thing that will be in the Order, there will be change. Change will always be there. It's how do we adapt and move forward and grow stronger at it. Thank you. MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Seguin.

23 MR. SEGUIN: Hey, I've been annoying enough 24 that people are learning my name. Hey, guys. Shawn 25 Seguin out of Pittsburgh.

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I just wanted to throw something down there 2 because the first gentleman said something that kind 3 of annoyed me, aggravated me personally. And this part here is going to annoy, probably, almost 5 everybody in this room. But as a member of the 6 under 40 club -- sorry guys, but as a member of the 7 under 40 club, when you say that I'm going to get 8 burned out, and I don't have that motivation, please 9 do not speak for me.

10 If you look around this room right now, you see a lot of -- all right? We may have a problem 11 12 getting people in, but once they're in, they're 13 sitting on that table up there. They're sitting 14 right over there. They're sitting over there. So please do not limit our passion by saying that we're 15 16 going to get burnt out because of a two-year tour if 17 we decide to go for it again, right?

18 We have that passion. You got to be strong 19 So don't -- please do not underestimate the people. 20 young guns that are volunteering. I know I'm not 21 one of them currently. Do not try to appoint me. 22 That being said, you have some amazing ones here. 23 And on the flip side of that, as a business 24 professional, right, just like a lot of us here, 25 working in the real world, what is being said here



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1	about needing that time to get on your feet, you
2	could be the number two. I was the number two for
3	my position I'm in right now. I was in that
4	position for four years. And I moved up to be the
5	boss.
6	Guess what? I had to re-learn all of my
7	relationships with everybody on that team. Because
8	now it's no longer just hey, it's me and my peer,
9	and we're having some fun, but now it's me going,
10	like, hey, where's that report? And you're re-
11	learning all of this. So now we're dealing with the
12	fires, you're rebuilding relationships, finding what
13	that team mentality is, checking in with your new
14	senior, checking in with your new junior. Maybe
15	they're new as well. Maybe they're repeats because
16	they got to do their two- year term, and you got to
17	jump up. There is a lot of learning involved in
18	that. So I really do think that two-year term or
19	opportunity, I should say, for a two-year term,
20	makes perfect sense for those three seats up there.
21	Thank you.
22	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Middleton.
23	MR. MIDDLETON: Just a point of personal
24	privilege, if I may, for just a second. As a member
25	of the over 80 club, I am so thrilled to hear you

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1	say that. Because us old long in the tooth guys need
2	to get the hell out of the way and let you guys move
3	up. And you have plenty of energy, and and I
4	want to encourage that as much as I possibly can,
5	that it's time for you guys to take over because you
6	know how to move us ahead in this century. So go
7	for it.
8	MS. FIGUEROA: Senior Vice Wetzel.
9	MR. WETZEL: Yes, Raymond Wetzel, California,
10	Senior Vice. PNC Garcia touched on a point, and I
11	would like to reiterate that, is that if a commander
12	decides to run for the second time, whatever, but
13	then you have a Junior Vice or Senior Vice that
14	wants to challenge that position, and they lose,
15	they're out.
16	They don't they don't back down. They don't
17	go back down. They're out. So I mean, that's
18	another thought right there is that, you know,
19	again, I revert back to the loss of talent. If that
20	person loses the loses. That's all I have to
21	say.
22	MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Siebels.
23	MR. SIEBELS: PNC Siebels. Speaking from
24	experience, I can tell you there's a lot of things
25	as a National Commander that you want to get done,

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1	but you can't because of outside forces. I could
2	write a book about outside forces. So I think it
3	I used to think this was a bad idea. Now I think
4	it's a great idea. I'm going to vote in favor.
5	But I can tell you, as a National Commander you
6	things happen you don't have any control over it.
7	But yet you still have that desire to get something
8	done. And if we pass this, keep in mind, that
9	doesn't mean the commander gets to jump in for a
10	second term. It's up to this Body to decide if he's
11	going to get a second term. So I'm going to go to
12	approve.
13	MS. FIGUEROA: Parliamentarian Abbey.
14	MR. ABBEY: Thank you. Parliamentarian Ed
15	Abbey. Most of you remember when you were still
16	fresh into the military, one of the first things you
17	had to do was learn your honors in history. Now,
18	what's the most Purple Hearts received by any
19	Patriot in your record? Ten. Gentleman from
20	Georgia, correct.
21	What's the youngest Patriot to receive the
22	medal? 12. He lied about it at enlistment, joined
23	the Navy, got bombed. And his parents were notified
24	while he was unconscious in Honolulu. He woke up,
25	regained consciousness, and was handcuffed to his

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bed because the MA said, you lied. Unfortunately, the president had already said everybody that's on active duty is in for the duration. And he spent the rest of his tour -- that might have been a Navy thing, but -- no.

Now, the most important question yet is, how many times in our history, and you can go right to our webpage, have we already had commanders that served two tours? Three times. So this is already just legitimizing what we've already done. Once again, we have set the precedent. Again, the tool is just being put into place for those that might.

13 Now, the rest of us that have not leadership 14 jobs but support roles as an adjutant, I can tell 15 you, I'm already on -- I'm trying to remember if I'm 16 on my fifth or my sixth department commander. So it 17 doesn't mean your staff is not going to give you 18 institutional knowledge. It's the team that you 19 come to the war with. You go to war with what you 20 got, not with what you wished you had.

Now, these people are in here. It is, as we all said, it is a volunteer position. But if everybody doesn't get the chance, how many war presidents did we have that we didn't change halfway through the war? How many presidents do we wish we



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1	could have kept a little bit longer? George
2	Washington said one term is enough for anybody. FDR
3	is going for his fourth.
4	It is based on the individual, and if we limit
5	them because of our precepts about what we think one
6	person can have I got my purple on my ninth
7	combat deployment at the age of 55. Don't tell me
8	what an old man can do because I scared well,
9	some 18-year-olds. But here's the thing and
10	that's the 80-year-olds, but
11	MR. WITT: Time.
12	MR. ABBEY: All right.
13	MS. FIGUEROA: National Senior Vice Olivarez.
14	MR. OLIVAREZ: National Senior Vice Olivarez. I
15	think some people are forgetting the word "option"
16	in this. You have to realize that when the current
17	National Commander, if this passes, puts out that in
18	writing he will run for a second year, that notifies
19	the senior and junior vice. And so it gives them
20	the option to stay in that position or run against
21	the National Commander. So this isn't hurting
22	anybody because they will be aware. It's not coming
23	out of the left side anywhere. Everybody on the NEC
24	will know that that current National Commander, if
25	this passes, is giving them the option to the rest

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1	of the team. So if it passes, great. If it doesn't,
2	we'll have to do something new or what I was always
3	talking about: ensuring that our PNCs are there to
4	assist the current National Commanders due to the
5	fact that they might have knowledge, institutional
6	knowledge, from stuff that they did back in 2000,
7	2012, whenever, that might come up again because
8	history always repeats itself. So to have them
9	present and helping us out is also a plus. But if
10	they're unavailable, and you get that second year,
11	just know that it's an option for them to do it and
12	that they're learning. And just keep on learning
13	and making everything better for the organization.
14	Thank you.
15	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Jackson.
16	MR. JACKSON: Patriot Jackson, National Home
17	Inspector. I think everybody is forgetting the one
18	thing that I keep hearing here about the team. What
19	this does and I was initially against this
20	because I said, well, six years. But what it does
21	for the Commander, the Senior Vice, and the Junior
22	Vice, it gives them an opportunity to work as a team
23	for a longer period of time.
24	So by the time that Junior Vice gets to the
25	commander position, they're well versed in what they

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1	need to do for this order and to move us forward.
2	So like I said, I initially was against this. But I
3	think this is going to affect the team in terms of
4	making the leadership team a viable more viable
5	group that'll benefit the Order more than anything
6	else. Thank you.
7	MS. FIGUEROA: Chaplain Cannon.
8	MR. CANNON: I'm in favor of the option for two
9	years. And I think we're on the right track. I
10	really do. I heard oh, yeah, 80 years old and 40
11	years old. I'm 76, and I look around as I look
12	around, we need to begin to train.
13	For instance, going the way we are now, I don't
14	know if we I went in the Marine Corps before I
15	became an officer, we always looked at the position
16	ahead of us, the rank ahead of us. And what
17	happened was, the fitness reports and those things
18	and those superiors there, they noticed the talents
19	that you had. That's probably what moved me up from
20	the enlisted ranks to officer. And I can stand here
21	and tell you, I made gunnery sergeant in ten and a
22	half years. And then on an officer.
23	Now, as a chaplain, I the first under
24	Commander Rivera, the I told him if I knew what
25	it was in chaplain to be, I would have bailed out

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because it was stuff that I saw that needed to come 2 together. This is why I began the chaplain's 3 training, which was almost disappointing because we had no participation. And I said to myself, okay, 5 what am I going to do? And the good Lord just let So to where we are now 6 me know, keep on, keep on. 7 -- and then we started our prayer team, et cetera, 8 et cetera, and then we started our prayer time, ten 9 minutes of the first 90 days of the year, January through March, ten minutes at noon time.

11 And what I'm trying to get to is, this is a 12 great idea. Great idea. Those guys that's coming 13 in, we have to look at we going over the hill and 14 the others coming up. We've got to look at that. 15 You know, when I'm not a chaplain, I'm going to be 16 gone, and somebody else is going to come up because 17 I'm training for that. Thank you.

MR. JENKINS: Theodore Jenkins. 18

MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Jenkins.

20 MR. JENKINS: I was kind of reluctant about 21 getting up. I'm in a position right now that it 22 going to take time because of the vision that I 23 have. I oversee an organization. And it scares me 24 not to be in a position because of the vision that I 25 have and the lack of a vision for those behind me.

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1	Where there is no vision, the people perish.
2	Where there's no vision for this organization, this
3	organization going to perish. I agree that you got
4	to have a good staff. Your staff got to be on it.
5	I will vote in favor of extension because
6	whoever's in that position, we as patriots shouldn't
7	be guessing at the way they want to take the
8	organization. They should be selling us on where and
9	how they're want to take this organization. Thank
10	you.
11	MS. FIGUEROA: We have a patriot online.
12	MR. PICKART: Technical difficulties.
13	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky. Call the question.
14	MS. FIGUEROA: The motion on the floor is to
15	disapprove this resolution. And there was a second.
16	All in favor to disapprove this resolution say, aye
17	nay.

10	conventions. Any Bylaws Committee amendment must be
11	heard and discussed at the National Convention. The
12	discussion must be open to any convention delegate."
13	Patriot Smrt.
14	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky. I motion to approve
15	this amendment.
16	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion on the floor to approve.
17	Is there a second?
18	MR. MIDDLETON: Middleton, Delegate from
19	Georgia. I second the motion.
20	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion to approve and a second.
21	Is there any discussion?
22	MR. MIDDLETON: Middleton, Delegate from
23	Georgia. I also was a member of that 2017 Bylaws
24	Committee where we rewrote the bylaws. And it was
25	our intent that there would be no bylaws between

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1	conventions, except in in some unbelievably
2	unusual circumstance. A couple of years ago, the
3	Bylaws Committee went a little renegade, I thought,
4	and we had four or five, I think, amendments that
5	were proposed between the convention that were
6	ratified by the NEC. And then when we came to
7	convention, we had to go through them all again and
8	ratify them. And I think as I recall, most of which
9	were not ratified.
10	So there's you know, I cannot imagine a
11	circumstance that a that there is something that
12	is so critical that has to be changed in these
13	bylaws that it can't wait until the next convention.
14	It just it's just preposterous.
15	MR. BRANDON: Commander Schaltenbrand,
16	Department of Kentucky. So this is the famous
17	resolution. They've got the editorial comments.
18	Here's the deal. What Patriot Middleton says is
19	correct. One bylaw committee went a little crazy.
20	They wrote bylaws and passed them through the NEC,
21	and they had to be rewritten.
22	Now or now, all we are trying to do is
23	things that Commanders see. So at the Department
24	Convention, the, NEC, National Executive Counsel, is
25	make sure that those bylaws that have to go to

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1	the NEC for approval come from command source, not
2	the Bylaws Committee.
3	MS. FIGUEROA: National Adjutant.
4	MR. ADKINS: National Adjutant Chuck Adkins
5	from the floor. Having seen a lot of the discussion
6	on e-mails about this. One of the big questions
7	that came up is, dire emergency is not fully
8	defined. Is it a snowstorm in Montana? California
9	getting slipped off into the ocean due to an
10	earthquake? Tornado in Texas? A fire at the
11	headquarters?
12	Trying to put yeah. It's kind of
13	subjective, and, you know, it doesn't really define
14	it. And you know, I agree that the intentions of the
15	Bylaws Committee in 2017, you know, put an amendment
16	in there of such importance that consequences
17	waiting to have it voted on it at the National
18	Convention would be detrimental to the Order. And
19	we had some. We can have more again.
20	So I think that this resolution should be
21	disapproved. I do ask that yes, I agree with
22	Patriot Schaltenbrand. Set the Judge Advocates',
23	you know, comments aside. But I think if you pass
24	this, it is going to hamper this is my opinion,
25	not from the Judge Advocates, it will hamper the
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1	National Commander, whoever he or she may be, and
2	the NEC's ability to govern the best interest of the
3	order.
4	MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Siebels.
5	MR. SIEBELS: PNC Siebels. The bylaws require
6	the Bylaws Committee to provide full details about
7	any bylaw that should be unanimously opposed. I
8	would like to hear the full details of why the
9	Bylaws Committee opposed it.
10	MR. OLIVAREZ: Rob Olivarez, Bylaws Committee
11	Chair. So this bylaw was given to us at the last
12	minute. And I had to call an emergency bylaws
13	meeting. I sent that out to all of our members to
14	have them review it. So when we went over it, it
15	was vague with no real clarification on what a dire
16	emergency was. It also stripped the Commander at
17	NEC, you know, to be able to do the abilities to
18	take care of our organization. So that was one of
19	the main reasons why everybody on the committee was
20	opposed to this this bylaws.
21	MR. FERGUSON: Patriot Wetzel.
22	MR. WETZEL: Yes. Raymond Wetzel, Senior Vice
23	Commander, Bylaws Committee. When I considered this
24	before I cast my vote on this, I looked at the
25	amendment already. Granted, it does not say dire

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1	emergency, but yet it is still showing two-thirds
2	vote by the NEC. It still has to go. And the thing
3	is, nothing is permanent. Even if something
4	happened, it still has to be voted on by the Body.
5	MR. OLIVAREZ: It takes effect immediately.
6	MR. WETZEL: Pardon me? Only temporary. It's
7	only a temporary thing. It's not permanent.
8	MR. OLIVAREZ: But it's immediate.
9	MR. WETZEL: But it's not permanent, and
10	everybody needs to understand that. It's not a
11	permanent change.
12	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot McIntosh.
13	MR. MCINTOSH: McIntosh, National Historian.
14	Patriot Middleton, I'm also a member of the over 80
15	club. But I'm also a member of the over 50 club.
16	I've been over 51 years as a member of the Military
17	Order of the Purple Heart. Last year we brought
18	this up, and the question was, from the floor, what
19	is a dire emergency? When we went back, reviewed it,
20	and decided to do this, we defined a dire emergency
21	is defined as a severe or terrible situation or
22	event, which, left unaddressed, would have a
23	detrimental effect on the order.
24	The last or 2023, there were seven bylaw
25	amendments to the NEC to vote on. There was no

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1	input on before the NEC voted from the
2	membership. That, number one, I find a travesty.
3	Also, they did not fare well in the last year's
4	convention. Most of them went down. Most most
5	of the bylaws that come out of a committee usually
6	would have no problem if it was held until the
7	convention. It doesn't have to be done now. We need
8	to have input.
9	And I'll give you an example of no input. In
10	2024, we voted down the first four bylaws that came
11	out of the Bylaws Committee. That gives you an
12	example of what happens when you don't have bylaws
13	vetted by the membership. So it's one of those
14	situations where we are not denigrating the
15	committee. What we are trying to do is make sure
16	and it has happened in three or four conventions in
17	a row, where the Bylaws Committee came up with
18	extensive bylaw amendments that ended up going down
19	for one reason or another.
20	So I strongly encourage everybody here to make
21	it to approve this. So you have an input when
22	any new bylaw amendment comes out from any from
23	the Bylaws Committee between conventions.
24	MR. MIDDLETON: Patriot Middleton. Permission
25	to speak for a second time.

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1	MR. FERGUSON: Patriot Milton wants to ask
2	permission to speak again. Will we give him a
3	second?
4	AUDIENCE: Aye.
5	MR. FERGUSON: Any opposed?
6	MR. MIDDLETON: Thank you. I'll be very brief.
7	If this year's bylaws resolutions that we've been
8	presented there's 16 of them. We've gone through
9	most of them. Just think that is there anything
10	here that you have heard today that was so pressing
11	that it that even if we didn't pass it today,
12	wouldn't be okay next year? And and that's been
13	my you know, looking at the last ten years or so
14	of Bylaws Committee's work, there's very few that
15	are of such immense importance that if it didn't
16	happen this year, we could take it up again next
17	year.
18	The one year, we had a bunch of bylaw
19	resolutions presented to the NEC, that then still
20	they went into effect immediately. Keep that in
21	mind. It does go into effect immediately, even
22	though it must be ratified at the convention. So
23	that could be 11 months of something that you really
24	don't want to happen because there's been no robust
25	discussion about it taking place and then has to be

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1	disapproved by the Supreme Body here. So there just
2	is seldom anything that is so critically important
3	it just has to be done by the NEC in between
4	conventions.
5	MR. FERGUSON: PNC Rivera.
6	MR. RIVERA: Yeah. So I've been involved with
7	I was the advocate when Felix when we got
8	those passed, those bylaws that were sent out and
9	were immediately passed. And I can tell you now,
10	the bylaws were rewritten and had to be resubmitted
11	when I was the commander in West Virginia. And they
12	all did pass. The only issue with them is there was
13	some wording stuff in them.
14	We needed to have those so that the departments
15	and the chapters could have meetings and vote
16	because of COVID. So some people said COVID was not
17	an emergency. Some people to this day think it's
18	not an emergency, right? So I'm completely opposed
19	to this.
20	Being a National Commander, when I picked the
21	people, I had nothing to do with it. Each person
22	does whoever they want to do it. But I mean, if you
23	elect somebody to be your National Commander, and
24	then you want to say, well, but we're going to
25	you're not going to be able to pass that or

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1	you're going to who dictates if it's an emergency
2	or not? Who dictates that?
3	Felix, I think that COVID was an emergency.
4	Wouldn't you think so? Yeah, 100 percent. My year,
5	we did it yeah, see, now we go, right. We
6	couldn't have meetings. So what, we just stop the
7	order? The order just stops because somebody says
8	it's not an emergency. So, I mean, I think that you
9	start getting down this rabbit hole on these things
10	like this, and it's why? Because we have a few
11	people that might not be happy with the way things
12	are going so we're just going to punish everybody.
13	That's the wrong way to do it. What we talked about
14	being a team you know, I've been involved, and
15	it's I've seen the bylaws. I've been a
16	commander. I know.
17	Look, you got to give that person up there the
18	ability to lead. We talked about giving them two
19	years and all this. Give them the ability to lead.
20	Give them that opportunity to pick their bylaw
21	committee, right, their bylaw committee that they
22	want for their year. And then if they want to do it
23	again, they can do it again.
24	The problem with this ever I need to be on a
25	bylaw committee. No, I do. No, I do. No, I want

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to rewrite this and stuff. Look, that's the reason 1 2 why guys like me get burnt out on this, the fighting, the arguing, and this. You know, I came 3 4 here to have a good time. That's why I get up and 5 walk out at the beginning of the bylaws. It's just 6 like, Jesus, I don't want to hear everybody argue 7 and bitch, you know. That -- that's the thing, is 8 you guys, you take it, you give it away, you take 9 it, you give it away.

10 Look, the National Commander -- I can assure 11 you, the people that are coming up and all this, 12 whoever does it, and all the ones that I've worked 13 with so far, definitely have the capacity to put 14 together a good bylaw committee. And if there is a 15 serious emergency, I promise you, it will get sent out to the NEC. And we will know about it. 16 They 17 pulled it back this year. Why? Because it wasn't 18 emergency. The four they did through, we talked 19 about it and said, hey, we're not going to do it. 20 That's all. Thank you.

21 MR. FERGUSON: National Adjutant.
22 MR. ADKINS: Thank you. National Adjutant
23 requests to speak for a second time briefly.
24 MR. FERGUSON: Body gives National Adjutant
25 Adkins a second chance to speak?

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1	AUDIENCE: Aye.
2	MR. ADKINS: All right. One of the things I
3	forgot to mention earlier Chuck Adkins, National
4	Adjutant from before. One of the things I forgot to
5	mention earlier is, you know, there was a question
6	last night during the bylaws meeting of whether or
7	not, you know, individuals had a chance to debate.
8	And in the bylaws, in between conventions and
9	immediately before convention, the bylaws,
10	amendments, resolutions, however we want to call
11	them, have to go to the NEC at least 15 days prior
12	to the date of the vote.
13	And during that time is when you have the
14	opportunity to do your debate. Trust me, on a
15	couple of the resolutions that were in the book,
16	trust me, I saw the e-mails. The debate was going
17	on, okay. So it you do have a chance to debate.
18	What do you think we're doing now on this floor? We
19	are debating the bylaws. Maybe the change to the
20	bylaws, because I do agree, maybe the entire
21	membership ought to have the opportunity to see
22	them. I thought so because I also sent them out by
23	Constant Contact. That wasn't done before. That
24	gives those that are not on the NEC a chance to
25	review them and contact their NEC representative and

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1	say, hey, yay or nay, depending on the proposed, you
2	know, action.
3	So, you know, I also find it interesting that,
4	yeah, okay, you know, two of the people, three, were
5	on there, you know. Again, what's dire emergency?
6	And what happens? You know, you know. So what's
7	the consequential, detrimental action going to
8	happen if nothing is taken up between?
9	MR. MCINTOSH: McIntosh requests the permission
10	to speed a second time. I have a definition of what
11	dire emergency is.
12	MR. FERGUSON: Can I can I turn around and
13	let me ask the Body. Body, do you will you all
14	allow McIntosh for a second?
15	AUDIENCE: Aye.
16	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 30 seconds, like
17	everybody else.
18	MR. FERGUSON: You're granted.
19	MR. MCINTOSH: There has been a couple people
20	question what a dire emergency is. When the patriot
21	or past National Commander Rivera was up there,
22	he said that they had to during COVID, to pass a
23	bylaw amendment so that chapters and departments
24	could have digital meetings. That is a definition
25	of a dire emergency.

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1	MR. FERGUSON: I'll allow one more. Then we
2	need to call for the vote.
3	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky. Obviously
4	intimately involved in this process, it's my
5	signature at the bottom of that page. Thank you for
6	your patience. I think we clearly defined what dire
7	emergency is. I think that it is an option that is
8	available. As an example, in the past, there was an
9	attempt and the commander does not pick the
10	Bylaws Committee, he or she, in order to move that
11	person forward and their agenda forward and then try
12	to change the bylaws to support that.
13	Bylaws should be, unlike politicians, very
14	difficult to change. Politicians change often.
15	Okay. There shouldn't be a long, arduous bylaws
16	issue brought up at every convention. But we have
17	seen that they have ballooned and done that because
18	it was too easy.
19	And I think that what we're asking is that in
20	the past, and what we are encouraging forward, is
21	that it should be bottom up and not top down. And
22	yes, maybe messages did go out. But I don't think
23	fully so, because communication has been an issue.
24	Not everybody was able to be able to say, and most
25	of us didn't know what the schedule was, that you

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guys met every second, Tuesday, Thursday, whatever,
early on. I take umbrage to the fact, and I had to
fight this because I was the Adjutant.

I gave on the 15th of June, this amendment, 4 5 that was signed by my department forward to the 6 National Adjutant because the bylaws does not 7 clearly state an end on date. But I gave that 8 person 15 days in order to be able to give it to the 9 committee. I was unaware that the committee met on 10 June 11th. And I do appreciate that the chairman of 11 the committee recognized that. We were in 12 communication. And he did the right thing by 13 bringing it up and allowing it. And then we 14 recognized that two more amendments came in, 16 and 15 17.

16 So, I mean, we tried to do that because I knew 17 that the Adjutant was under the gun and had to make 18 sure that, not like the past, if he didn't get it 15 19 days before the convention, we could have burned all 20 these to the ground. But I think it's important to 21 note, as an example, in the past, in between 22 conventions, the NEC by virtue of the Bylaws 23 Committee, decided to say they had the ability to 24 contract multi-year contract subsequent to the 25 approval by the next convention.

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1	But once you would have entered into a contract
2	for multi years, and it didn't pass on the floor,
3	contractually, the whole order would have still been
4	obligated for the remainder of that contract. Good
5	ideas, but not soundly thought out, and I'm not
6	saying that everybody does stupid, you know, first.
7	But we have to be careful, which is why we really
8	want the Bylaws Committee to do their job, review
9	that. Part of their job, number one, is to be a
10	time out?
11	MR. FERGUSON: Time.
12	MR. SMRT: is to help and assist in the
13	writing of those things rather than being the
14	progenerators of that. You help the departments
15	bottom up.
16	MR. FERGUSON: That's why I said call for the
17	question after he finished.
18	MS. FIGUEROA: Call for the question? The
19	motion on the floor is to approve resolution 2024-
20	14. All in favor of this resolution, aye.
21	AUDIENCE: Aye.
22	MS. FIGUEROA: All opposed, say nay.
23	AUDIENCE: Nay.
24	MR. SMRT: Request a division of the body. That
25	was sort of odd.

25	this resolution. Is there a second?

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1	MR. SMRT: Second, Smrt, Kentucky, for moving
2	for discussion.
3	MS. FIGUEROA: Motion to approve and second. Is
4	there any discussion? No discussion. Oh, I take
5	that back. Parliamentarian Abbey.
6	MR. ABBEY: Parliamentarian Abbey. I do not
7	see any place where it addresses the improper
8	positioning of officers within chapters. We have
9	multiple chapters within this organization that
10	have, you know, the same person holding two critical
11	positions out of the three. This is not addressed.
12	So if that one person shows up, do they get counted
13	twice?
14	AUDIENCE: No.
15	MR. ABBEY: But we're saying required
16	positions, and we've got people there's no way to
17	say it illegally.
18	MR. MIDDLETON: Doug Middleton, Department of
19	Georgia Delegate. Can I ask the Committee Chair,
20	that it is zero yays and seven nays from the
21	committee, what they discussed?
22	MR. OLIVAREZ: National Senior Vice Robert
23	Olivarez, Committee Chair on the floor. So after I
24	sent this out for review, I was under the
25	understanding and then I was educated by a good

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patriot, Mister -- it sounds wrong the way to say 2 it, Mr. Raper. And so -- I see where he is coming 3 from, and I believe this will actually help our organization.

5 When it comes to setting up the meetings at the 6 chapter level, a lot of our younger patriots that 7 are moving up and moving through the chairs don't 8 know exactly what to do or how to properly hold a 9 meeting. This right here will help them have the 10 right amount of people to have to hold a quorum and 11 teach them the right way to hold their meetings. Ιt 12 wasn't specific.

13 I was always under the impression, coming up 14 through the chairs, and this is just the way I was 15 taught in my chapter is that your first five, if one 16 of the first five wasn't there, that would be your 17 commander, senior, junior, then your finance, and 18 sergeant-at-arm, one of them would be in charge if 19 the one above them wasn't there. But it doesn't 20 clarify this in our bylaws. But that would help 21 clarify it for the new guys coming in.

22 So, originally, we did disapprove as we felt 23 like National couldn't tell a chapter how to run 24 their meetings and how many people they needed 25 But seeing how Patriot Raper explained it to there.

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1	me, I think this would be beneficial in helping some
2	of the newer members knowing what the chain of
3	command is when it comes down to holding a proper
4	quorum.
5	MS. FIGUEROA: Question from online.
6	MR. KROPTAVICH: Well, I just I'm just try
7	to break you guys a National Judge Advocate opinion
8	real quick here. There is concern about whether a
9	person, when they hold more than one position,
10	whether they count as two. Legally a person does
11	not does not define is not defined as the
12	number of positions you hold, but you are still one
13	person, whether you hold one position or 1,000.
14	Hopefully that answers that issue.
15	MS. FIGUEROA: PNC Rivera.
16	MR. RIVERA: PNC Rivera. So I was looking at
17	this. At first, I was like the seven days myself,
18	and then when reading through it and I had got
19	clarification on it. So it requires, "One of the
20	three patriots shall be a required officer of the
21	chapter." So what that means is, we are required to
22	have a commander, a finance officer, and then the
23	appointed adjutant, right?
24	AUDIENCE: Right.
25	MR. RIVERA: So what that means is, one of
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1	those three people have to be in attendance at the
2	meeting in order for them to run the meeting. So
3	there's times that maybe only one of those people
4	come. It happens with us a lot where the other two
5	may not make it. So now we're like, oh, we don't
6	have a quorum. We don't have the officers here.
7	So you know, a lot of times it burns people out
8	because of, man, I've been to a meeting, and maybe
9	the commander is sick, and he doesn't come here.
10	And they're like, I guess we can't have a meeting.
11	You know, it's not like we have in some of the
12	meetings that we have, we have over 200 and
13	something patriots. And I can tell you, we
14	there's meetings that, you know, that maybe somebody
15	doesn't show up.
16	So something like this would actually be a good
17	way to show the Chapters, hey, you know, we
18	understand that we still want you to conduct
19	business. You still need to define quorum. So you
20	still got the five people to vote. I think this is
21	a good bylaw.
22	MS. FIGUEROA: Patriot Smrt.
23	MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky. The only confusion
24	that I have is required officer. Because it was
25	just recently titled, I would assume that it is an

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1	elected officer because an adjutant could be
2	appointed and is appointed, obviously, and cannot do
3	that. It should be an elective officer, if that is
4	the meaning. But I'm not certain that that is.
5	Because in some cases, because of chapter
6	divination and the way they do it, you could have a
7	Commander, a Senior Vice Commander that also has the
8	responsibility as the devoted adjutant, you know.
9	But the adjutant can't be the finance officer. A
10	Commander could be a finance officer, but it you
11	know, adjutant could be one of the elected officers.
12	So we're sort of playing semantics. And we all wish
13	we had a plethora of associates to be able to assist
14	us. I would be more than happy over a tall adult
15	beverage this evening to ask whether or not, you
16	know, how they have, in the past, really bolstered
17	and proved that.
18	Can someone prove come up online either from
19	Georgia or elsewhere that that's responsible for
20	this to clearly identify what the required officer
21	actually means?

10	use it. Whether the Publication Committee will
11	manage it, or some outside agency would manage it.
12	And the other big question, I think, is or
13	there's two more. One is the frequency and how long
14	should we be doing it, continue to do it bimonthly,
15	or do we do a paper copy semi-annually or annually,
16	have all been suggested. And how we lend the
17	content to something that is affordable, whether we
18	do it strictly the the features and some of the
19	date type stuff of this particular date and leave
20	out all of the chapter input, or whether we try to
21	do something for chapter input. But I think in
22	terms of cost, we probably should probably target
23	30 to 35 pages to keep it somewhere in the
24	reasonable range.
25	And then the the other the other main

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1	reason or not reason, but to make consideration
2	for this is, how do we get everybody's attention to
3	subscribe with over 20,000 people not having a valid
4	e- mail address. That will be a significant cost.
5	It costs us over \$3,000 to mail 5,000 members.
6	Alan, do you have any input or questions?
7	MR. GIBSON: No, I'm good Larry. Listen to
8	you. I took notes. I agree. Those are those
9	are hard. Those are things we need to make when we
10	run it. We make and we have to have all the info
11	that you stated from the different districts or
12	chapters, you know. And and we as you know,
13	it's hard. We've been working this for past couple
14	of months now, and so we need to decide on what
15	we want to do and just and go with it.
16	MR. LEIGHTON: And I think it if decision is
17	approved, if the body's approve going to paper copy,
18	we've got to get them to sign on with the chapters
19	in saying, yeah, the chapters are going to make sure
20	that their members are informed either from their
21	output, their national or monthly magazine, or
22	whatever the chapters do to reach all of their
23	people. The ones that don't (audio cuts out) I
24	think you got to get I don't know. I know we
25	have to have something better than what we better

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1	response than we had last time for the survey if
2	we're going to get this out, if it's approved.
3	But the other thing that I think is important
4	to come across in the decision brief is it has an
5	implementation plan that has to be developed and
6	it's not immediately ready.
7	MR. FERGUSON: Correct. This is National
8	Commander Ferguson. So one of the things you
9	remember in the meeting that we had is that we came
10	back in and we talked about having the regions to
11	scroll the departments in the chapters in in
12	for the hard- copy magazine, and we have the regions
13	support the magazine. So they would pick through
14	each one of the departments, the chapters to put in
15	so we can keep it down at the 35 pages. Did I miss
16	something? Everybody's got quiet now.
17	MR. LEIGHTON: All right. I had you were
18	cut out, or somebody over you, popped over top of
19	you, Carder. I missed the part about regions.
20	MR. FERGUSON: Yeah. Remember, we had a couple
21	meetings ago in reference to where we were
22	talking about how to do the hard-copy magazine, and
23	that was referenced that we would do that as a
24	region. Can can you hold on, Larry? Can
25	everybody hear me?

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1	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah.
2	MR. FERGUSON: Can everybody hear me?
3	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.
4	MR. FERGUSON: Please keep it down. I have a
5	publications meeting that your thank you. So
6	Larry, as we were talking about was, again, the
7	region was going to scroll the departments and
8	chapters and select what they need to input, so then
9	that way we get the national information and the
10	region information out. That would include some of
11	the chapters and the departments, so then that way
12	that would go out.
13	MR. LEIGHTON: Okay.
14	MR. FERGUSON: I think that would probably be
15	the best way in keeping at 35 pages. And then, that
16	way, all we had to do was divide it down by each one
17	of the regions would have so many pages.
18	MR. LEIGHTON: That that's a good point.
19	I'll make sure that that would go into the potential
20	for the contract when we go out ready to go out,
21	if we just have to go out, request for information
22	or request for bids from different publications.
23	MR. FERGUSON: Roger that. I appreciate that.
24	MR. LEIGHTON: And the only other thing I had
25	on the agenda would be, what are we going to do for
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1 September and October? What kind of theme do we 2 want? Obviously, the new national commander will 3 have some input that -- but in general, we'll 4 continue to go on the digital version the way we 5 have in the past. Chapter, department input and a 6 few feature articles that we get from -- that we 8 steal from other publications.

8 MR. FERGUSON: I think that would be correct. 9 Like I said, we just have to have another meeting to 10 decide on the theme that's on that. And then, 11 obviously, we have somebody to help us with the 12 magazine cover.

13 MR. LEIGHTON: Right. And the last thing I've 14 got, of course, is the resolution to -- to dissolve 15 the National Publications Committee. The wrong one was put in the book. The wrong one was briefed to 16 17 the Bylaws Committee. A correction that was sent 18 back in May was sent again last night. I think 19 Keith, or someone, is going to bring it up on the 20 floor today so they could be considered. It was a 21 It should have been considered a typo. tvpo. 22 Section 16 -- or Section 6 versus Section 14 in the 23 last resolve. That's the only difference. But, 24 apparently, the Bylaws Committee were inundated with 25 people saying it was not valid because there is no



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1 Section 14 in that --MR. FERGUSON: All right. I think --2 MR. LEIGHTON: Hopefully --3 MR. FERGUSON: I think that should go in front 4 5 of the Bylaws Committee and that they -- to determine that. So --6 7 MR. LEIGHTON: Yeah, but it has to be brought 8 up today. 9 MR. 23	It was used as a tool, but it has, and always has, a
24	life for internal communications as well as the
25	official publication of the Order.

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1	And if you go back in there, it talks about
2	notices and how the command structure is supposed to
3	inform the population. And it gave, you know, the
4	the Order also a degree of, you know,
5	responsibility, no matter who the commander was,
6	which is why it was a four, three, two, one term,
7	because nobody, you know, was beholden to any one
8	person. You got elected by the NEC post-convention.
9	You served your terms. If you wanted to renew, you
10	could. Last year was a difficult year. There were
11	there were at least three of the four positions
12	filled. One person resigned that the day later,
13	and it ended up with only two people, so the
14	committee was immediately short two and never got
15	plussed up. So it put a burden upon former Adjuvant
16	Leighton, and he took that responsibility and he
17	he did publish that.
18	But it's internal communications, whereas PR is
19	external with immediate information, but not, you

MCINTOSH: Can I -- can I have permission 5 to speak again on rebuttal? 6 MR. WERTHEIM: Patriot Leighton, are -- this is 7 Craig Wertheim, Department of Florida. Patriot 8 Leighton, are you leaving as the editor of the 9 magazine? 10 MR. LEIGHTON: Am I leaving? No, not unless 11 I'm told to. 12 MR. WERTHEIM: Okay. So who -- who is the P --13 who is -- who is our PR director? 14 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No one. We haven't had 15 one in years. 16 MR. LEIGHTON: We haven't -- there hasn't been 17 one for some years. 18 MR. WERTHEIM: So I -- I'm confused. We're --19 so we're taking -- so in other words, you are 20 looking to find a boss? 21 MR. LEIGHTON: I'm looking to have -- as a 22 commander, have more reasons to select a public 23 relations director. 24 MR. WERTHEIM: So do we -- did we put in the 25 budget for a PR director?

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MR. LEIGHTON: I didn't say you had to hire 1 2 one. 3 MR. WERTHEIM: Right. 4 MR. LEIGHTON: You can appoint it --5 MR. WERTHEIM: Yeah, but do we have money to 6 put --7 MR. RIVERA: No, it's a patriot just like --8 MR. WERTHEIM: So we're --9 MR. RIVERA: -- travel --10 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: -- communications. 11 MR. WERTHEIM: I understand that, but the --12 but a PR director would be -- you can't have a full 13 -- you can't have a -- that's a full-time position. 14 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Right. 15 MR. WERTHEIM: You can't have somebody doing it 16 part-time in-between their regular life. That's a 17 full- time job that has to be taken and it -- a PR 18 director of 20-plus years ago is not the same as one 19 today, and I know we have the social media person, 20 but that's not just posting on Facebook, and 21 Instagram, and -- that, you need a whole campaign 22 that would be done -- it would encompass everything 23 that we're doing on a daily basis, and you need a 24 full-time person to execute that to the tune of, 25 probably, \$80,000 to \$100,000 that we would pay

SMRT: Burcher in the past didn't do it for 4 free. 5 MR. RIVERA: No. He didn't do it for free. He 6 averaged -- you know, he was a contracted -- sorry. 7 PNC Rivera. When Burcher did it before, he was --8 he was contracted, and it was between 60,000 and 9 80,000 a year. 10 MR. WERTHEIM: And that was how long ago? 11 MR. RIVERA: It's been since 2018. 12 MR. REED: '18. 13 MR. WERTHEIM: Okay. So I'm probably pretty 14 close with those numbers of the salary for somebody 15 hired today. 16 MR. REED: So that's --17 MR. WERTHEIM: That's probably --18 MR. REED: That's the reason I was trying to 19 take out that one word --20 MR. WERTHEIM: -- a few years into their 21 career. So I -- I would say that we would keep our 22 magazine the way it is, and we need to find a couple 23 of other people to go on the Publications Committee 24 to help Patriot Leighton publish the magazine. 25 MR. GRAY: I'll take the last one and then



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1	we're going to close for comments and
2	MR. MCINTOSH: I concur with that last thing
3	about putting two more people on there, on the
4	Publications Committee, because you do need a
5	committee that understands what's going on. And
6	we're talking about a PR guy selecting an editor for
7	a magazine. I would bet you any amount of money,
8	none of you can figure out a good way to try to test
9	out how an editor should be worked.
10	To fill you in, when we had to put an editor
11	in, we ended up two or three people, and what we did
12	is we had them gave them information on a
13	2,000-word article and said make it 500. Here's a
14	bunch of pictures. We only had one and she happened
15	to be a professional and she taught how to do this
16	at the university where she was working. What to
17	what goes on is the PR guy, his total focus,
18	training, and expertise, if they're any good, does
19	not involve the grunt work it requires to put out a
20	magazine.
21	Frankly, one of the things that somebody asked
22	me, you know, "How's the magazine today?" I said,
23	"Well, one thing is obvious. Larry put in one hell

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24

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of a lot of hours. I would say 150 to 180 hours to

put out that magazine." So it's one of those

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1	situations where you're trying to put somebody that
2	has no clue as to how to put out a magazine, how to
3	put it together. And I was blessed for what, 12 to
4	16 years? I can't remember which. Chris had been
5	the art director for a magazine. So anyway, he
6	taught me a hell of a lot. The former editor taught
7	me a lot to be able to do it for three years, so I
8	know how hard that is, and a PR guy I was
9	averaging, first time, it was 180 hours. Three
10	years later, I had it down to 85 hours.
11	MR. GRAY: Okay. And I'm not trying to cut you
12	off but one more rebuttal?
13	MR. SMRT: Yes, sir. Rebuttal.
14	MR. GRAY: Then we're going to close it up.
15	MR. SMRT: I I encourage everybody on the
16	committee to go tonight to Section 6 of Article 12,
17	which, according to the presentation, says "will be
18	deleted." Not parts of it. All of Section 6 is to
19	be deleted. In summary, the composition, the fact
20	that these are elected in four-year terms. Meeting
21	during the convention. The committee shall select
22	their own chair. The edit work on getting an
23	editor, if possible, if there's money, because
24	that's not free. Charge the chairman with a search
25	committee to move forward on things. Select

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1	editors. Determine publishing, advertising, and
2	editorial policies. PR directors don't know
3	anything about that. Promote the Order's social
4	media program, national websites, and any other
5	things that support, because, obviously, as the
6	official publication, you know, we want to promote
7	and every other source to be able to access.
8	Magazine shall be the official publication of
9	the Order, USA. Official notices and orders
10	published in the Purple Heart magazine shall be
11	deemed sufficient and lawful notice to all members
12	of all purposes whatsoever. That is probably the
13	missed most historic section of that because that
14	is the responsibility upon which all subsequent
15	things were there, because it's the official
16	publication and and that dates back to long, long
17	time, and we could do research.
18	Magazine sent to every member. We've fallen
19	because we didn't have money, but it but that was
20	still in there and the hope was that if we could get
21	money for donations or sponsorship, that would be
22	reinstated. That's why last year a single hard-copy
23	magazine was put out.
24	Hold the chairman responsible for preparation
25	of budgets. I mean, so if if there is a magazine
l	

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1	or a committee, obviously they have budget
2	responsibility. Publication Committee obviously must
3	provide editor staff and everything else to assist
4	in the publication and the editor production and
5	staff, if there is money for staff, obviously, even
6	if they're compensated as civilians, they have to
7	have the people here on the committee to be able to
8	assist. The ideal is that sooner or later monies
9	may be available and then we can execute and
10	reestablish things. We've been woefully inadequate,
11	but I don't have to tell you guys the difficulty
12	with money. But if we delete Section 6 please
13	look at that tonight. That is a killer, and a PR
14	director appointed, even if if their
15	responsibility is quote, "to find an editor," that
16	editor's not responsible for anything. And who do
17	they answer to? An appointed person who who
18	worked directly for the commander each year?
19	MR. GRAY: Okay.
20	MR. SMRT: So please read it. Thank you.
21	MR. GRAY: Thank you for that. And since we
22	had some rebuttals from the floor, I'm going to
23	Larry, do you have anything that you needed to
24	rebuttal or are you good?
25	MR. LEIGHTON: I'm good. Thank you.

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1	MR. GRAY: Okay. So Keith Gray, Bylaws
2	Committee. At this time we're going to close the
3	discussion on the floor. I'm going to ask the
4	committee, Committee, do you have anything else you
5	want to add before we vote on this?
6	MR. REED: No.
7	MR. GRAY: Okay. Hearing none. So what we're
8	voting on now is, are we making the recommendation
9	to yes or no to the committee to pass this
10	tomorrow? So all in favor, yes, go ahead and raise
11	your hand.
12	MR. RIVERA: No, we don't. We have to pass it
13	forward.
14	MR. RIVERA: Yeah, we have to send it forward
15	with our recommendation. That's what I'm asking
16	for.
17	MR. RIVERA: recommendation.
18	MR. REED: recommendation.
19	MR. GRAY: Are we making the recommendation to
20	approve it?
21	MR. RIVERA: recommendation
22	MR. GRAY: Raise your hand.
23	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: recommendation say
24	aye.
25	MR. GRAY: Okay. Hearing none, all moving

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1	forward, but not recommendation, raise your hand.
2	Two, three, four, five, six. We have six that are
3	wanting to send it forward but not approving this to
4	go forward to the body tomorrow.
5	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Six opposing.
6	MR. REED: Six opposing.
7	MR. GRAY: Six opposing.
8	MR. SMRT: You recommend disapproval?
9	Recommending disapproval.
10	MR. REED: Right, recommend disapproval.
11	MR. GRAY: disapproval with six. Any
12	abstentions? One abstention. Okay. And with that,
13	there's nothing else on our agenda. We're going to
14	go ahead, and I'll take a motion to close the
15	meeting.
16	MR. REED: Craig?
17	MR. REED: I'll make a motion to close the
18	meeting.
19	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Wait, wait, wait, wait,
20	wait.
21	MR. REED: You got you got something you
22	want to say?
